Women Voters National Convention April 28, May 1

The Chinese Ambassador to the United States, Hu Shih, heads the distinguished list of speakers for the four-day biennial convention of the National League of Women Voters being held April 28 through May 1 at the Palmer House, Chicago. Richard Tawney, distinguished British author and economic historian, will appear with Dr. Hu before a League-sponsored public meeting in the Palmer House at 8:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 29. These two speakers will discuss the ideals for which China and Great Britain are fighting.

Following the opening business meeting Tuesday, April 28, Bernard De Voto, author and editor of "The Easy Chair" in Harper's Magazine, will deliver the keynote speech at 9 p.m. His recent columns urging civilians to fulfill the duties of citizenship keep pace with the League's wartime service program of keeping the public informed about wartime government.

Edgar Ansel Mowrer, deputy director of the Office of Facts and Figures and former chief of the Chicago Daily News Bureau in Paris, will address the luncheon meeting, May 1, which closes the convention sessions. Mr. Mowrer spent three months in the Far East last fall, returning to this country two weeks before Pearl Harbor.

Delegates from thirty-two state Leagues and nearly 600 local Leagues are expected to attend the sessions which mark the National League's twenty-second anniversary. Business meetings at which the League selects its own program are scheduled each day of the convention.

By paying a registration fee of \$3.00 for all sessions, an accredited visitor is entitled to the same privileges as delegates with the exception of the privilege of the floor. After the quota has been filled for accredited visitors, provision has been made for daily visitors on a fee basis of \$1.00. It is a rare opportunity for League enthusiasts to see how the national program is considered and adopted.
