Third Week of Drive for Funds For Post Paper

The third week of the drive in North Shore towns, conducted by the Fort Sheridan Volunteers' Committee in conjunction with the Fort Sheridan Tower Sponsors, Inc., is expected greatly to surpass the previous two weeks in volume of financial aid developed for civilian activities on the Post for the benefit of the enlisted personnel.

This was the announcement Sunday of Mrs. Lester R. Wellman of Highland Park, chairman of the executive committee of the Volunteers. The purpose of the drive is to obtain funds for the furnishing of day rooms at the Fort and for the development of the new weekly newspaper, The Fort Sheridan tower, which is to be the official publication and distributed free of charge among the enlisted men.

The announcement followed a general meeting of the Fort Sheridan Volunteers' Committee at the Service Club on the Post. The expansion in activities of the committee had so aroused the interest of North Shore women who have been working on the Post project that the meeting became a "know-your-fellow-worker" gathering in which the future activities of the group were planned. Mrs. Wellman presided and introduced subcommittee chairmen who explained how they were functioning and presented gratifying reports on the fund raising campaign. The turn-out was large and enthusiastic.

There was discussion in detail on the increase in the committee's activities to include the development of funds for the new Fort Sheridan Tower, which has been undertaken by the Fort Sheridan Tower Sponsors, Inc., a group of advertising and newspaper executives living along the North Shore.

Lieut. Edwin L. Stoll, Post Public Relations Officer, in a short address, conveyed the greetings and appreciation of Col. F. C. Rogers, commanding the Post. Various members of the civilian group emphasized the value of the Post newspaper in the building and maintenance of morale because it is an intimate chronicle of the activities of the men themselves. It was also stressed that the paper is a "not-for-profit" project and that its income beyond operating expenses go into the educational and recreational fund for the enlisted men.

Important meetings of various committees in the general campaign will be held during the week.

Fund of Bundles for Bluejackets Dependent on Gifts

From the Chicago Headquarters of Bundles for Bluejackets Inc. comes the word that the funds for the Comfort Kits, for the boys in training at Great Lakes, Navy Pier and the Coast Guard and Marines, are very low. This fund depends on voluntary contributions and on "benefits" for its maintenance. 20,000 kits have already been distributed and have proved such an outstanding success with the boys that they must continue to go to all boys as they leave for active duty in the Navy.
