**WHERE HONOR IS DUE**  
Although General MacArthur's spectacular defense of the Bataan peninsula gathered all the headlines, praise and honor is also due other high-ranking officers who kept up the unspectacular but very necessary part of the defense.

One unsung hero who has done a great job is Maj. Gen. George F. Moore, in command of the harbor defenses of Corregidor. General Moore's anti-aircraft guns bagged so many Japanese planes that the Japs didn't relish flying over Corregidor very much.

Then there is Brig. Gen. Charles C. Drake, the quartermaster, who has the heartbreaking job of rationing supplies down to almost nothing.

Another man who performed military miracles is Brig. Gen. Albert M. Jones. He commanded the southern sector of Luzon, south of Manila, and accomplished the seemingly impossible job of withdrawing his beach defenses to join the forces of General Wainwright on Bataan.

Then there is Gen. James R. N. Weaver, in command of tanks, together with Generals Joseph P. Vachon, William E. Brougher, Bradford G. Chynoweth, William F. Sharp, Allan C. McBride, Clyde A. Selleck, Clinton A. Pierce, and Arnold J. Funk, all unsung heroes.

Note: General Wainwright should not be criticized for commanding part of the battle of Bataan from Corregidor. General MacArthur, according to those returning from the Philippines, also directed the Bataan battles from Corregidor.

### MARKET INFORMATION LEAKS

Government sleuths are probing a series of mysterious leaks of important market information from key war agencies.

On several occasions recently certain Wall Street traders have obtained advance tips on important moves to be made by the War Production board, the Office of Price Administration and the agriculture department.

In one instance cotton brokers got wind of an agriculture parity price announcement 45 minutes before it was made public. This announcement was supposed to be absolutely secret until publication. The market operators not only learned about it, but used the information for private profit.

The WPB order banning all non-essential building construction also was tipped off in advance to certain members of the building trade. So, too, was the OPA's action imposing a price ceiling on fats and oils, and allowing an increase in wool prices. Word regarding this move leaked out two days before the order was issued.

Under suspicion for these leaks are certain dollar-a-year men, who, while not directly connected with these matters, were in a position to learn about them and to tip off business friends.

### MERRY-GO-ROUND

As early as 1939, General "Hap" Arnold, chief of the air corps, told officials of the Insular Affairs bureau that if he were an enemy he would like nothing better than the assignment of bombing Pearl Harbor. He pointed out that the navy was always huddled close together in the harbor, that the harbor's mouth was narrow, making it difficult to get out, and that it was a perfect target for the Truman air attack.

The Truman committee is investigating sensational charges by the Long Beach (Calif.) Independent that southern California airplane factories and shipyards are far behind schedule, having been delayed by cost plus charges, slowdown tactics, arbitrary union hiring, extortionate initiation fees, farcical inspections. It is also charged that one plant, scheduled to be in full production last June, is far from even fractional production. Meanwhile local plants stand empty awaiting government orders.

New influx into Washington is the Australian War Supplies mission. About 180 of them are coming to town.

Although a Democrat, Congressman Vincent Harrington of Iowa made the Republican Lincoln day address at LeMars, Iowa, last month.

A government filing clerk found the name "John Bull" mentioned in correspondence on lend-lease aid to England. She brought the letter to a superior and asked, "Who is Mr. Bull?"

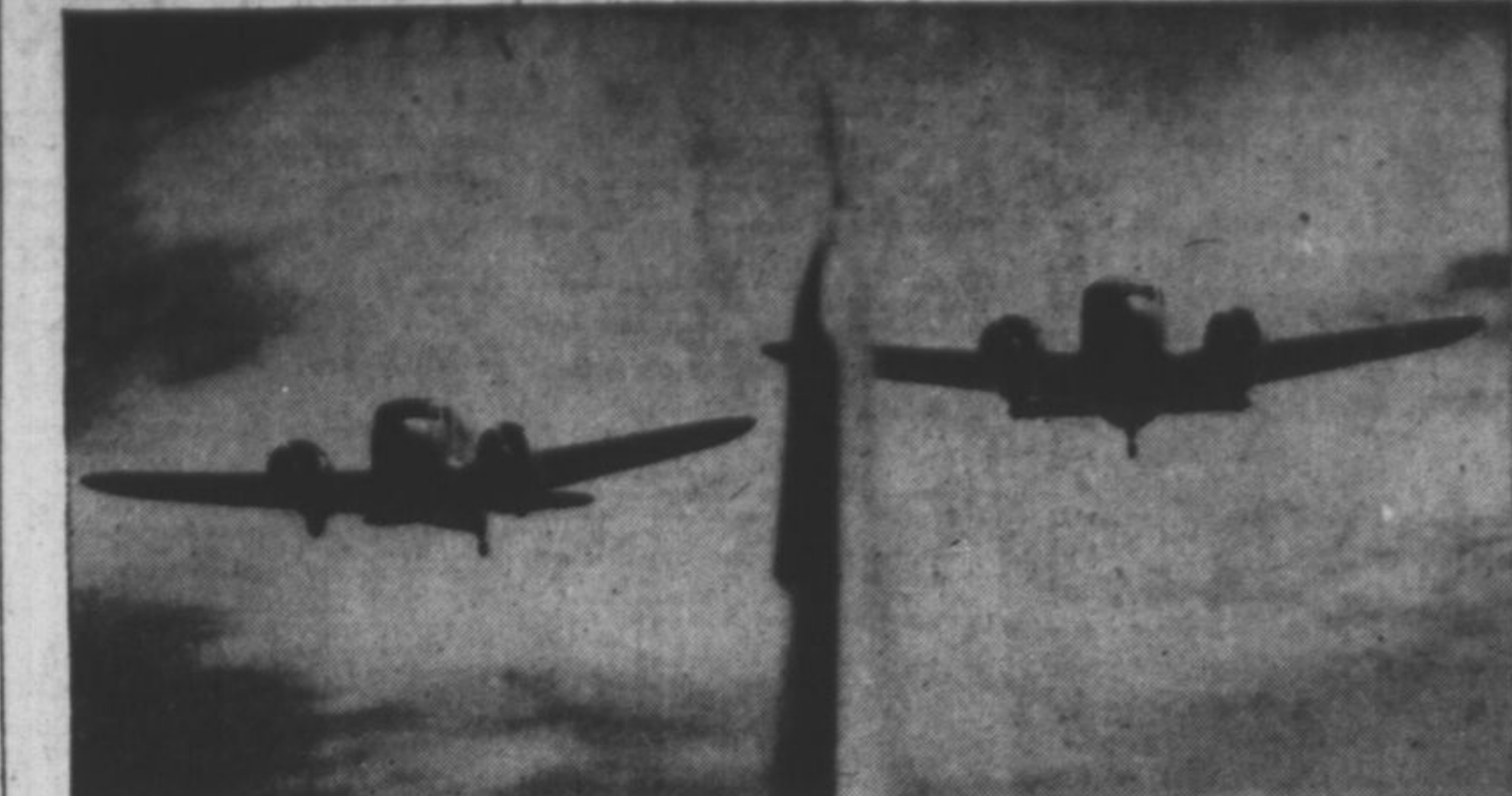
Congressmen are alarmed by the threatened paper shortage, which may curtail Government Printing.

### List Northwestern Football Ticket Schedule and Price

Ticket prices for Northwestern university's war-time football schedule of seven home games next fall will range from \$2.20 for the opening game with the Iowa Naval Cadets to a top of \$2.75 for the remaining games, it was announced today by K. L. Wilson, Director of Athletics.

Season tickets for all home games will be \$15, a saving of \$3.70 over the individual game price. The home schedule includes games with Iowa Naval Cadets, Texas, Purdue, Ohio State, Illinois, Wisconsin, and Great Lakes. The latter game will be played on Thanksgiving day, marking the first time the Wildcats have played on this day in many years.

Director Wilson also announced that the Ohio State game, Oct. 24, had been designated as combined Homecoming and Dad's Day game. Armistice day will be observed at the Illinois game, Nov. 7.

The usual five-game home card was increased by the addition of the two service teams to the schedule. In addition to the home schedule, the Wildcats will play three away-from-home games with Michigan, Minnesota, and Notre Dame. The complete schedule with prices follows:

### William M. Marks Elected to 3rd Term By L. C. Republicans

William M. Marks of Lake Villa, who has served as Chairman of the Republican Central Committee of Lake County for the past two terms, was reelected Monday night at the circuit court room at Waukegan, defeating John J. Spellman of Lake Forest, by a 3 to 1 majority.

Bernard Juron placed his name in nomination and pointed to the successful manner in which Marks has conducted the management of the Republican Party affairs in Lake County during the past four years. He cited the appointment of Marks to the State Patronage committee of five by Governor Green.

The final tabulation of the vote gave Marks 16,925 to Spellman's 5,964.

"I will do the best I can with the help of you committeemen," said Marks. "Our greatest effort should be in the winning of the war. But we must maintain our two-party system."

"I have served two terms and this will be my last," Jack Bairstow of Waukegan, was unanimously elected Chairman of the Lake County Democratic Central Committee in the County Court Room. In accepting the chairmanship Bairstow pleaded for continued harmony in Democratic ranks.

### H. S. Coaches Will Attend N. W. Clinic

Two hundred high school coaches from Chicago and vicinity will attend Northwestern university's annual spring football clinic Saturday (May 2). The day long program will be featured by an intra-squad game which will wind up spring football practice for the Wildcats.

Most of the discussions and demonstrations at the clinic will center around the T formation with which Northwestern has been experimenting this spring. This discussion will be led by Coach Ralph Jones of Lake Forest who did much to develop the formation while he was coach of the Chicago Bears.

Chuck Palmer, football coach at Fenger high school, Chicago, and a former Northwestern star will lead a discussion on high school offense. Other speakers on the morning program will include Coaches Lynn Waldorf, Burt Ingwersen and Wes Fry of the Northwestern coaching staff.

The football game in the afternoon will reveal how much progress was made this spring in developing replacements for the 19 senior lettermen who will be lost to the Wildcats by graduation in June. About 45 players, most of whom are freshmen, have taken part in the spring practice.

Northwestern's practice has been devoted largely to a study of a variation of the T formation which will probably become a part of the Wildcat offense next fall. The formation as used by Northwestern differs from the orthodox T formation in that the quarterback does not handle the ball and the line is unbalanced instead of balanced.

Loss of all of last year's regular backs, except Otto Graham, has placed stress on the development of freshman backfield candidates this spring. Among the newcomers who showed promise of developing into varsity candidates next fall were Joe Scriba, a shifty, hard running halfback from Owasso, Mich.; Nick Vodick, a rangy fullback from South Bend; Harry Franck, halfback, a brother of George Franck, former Minnesota star, and Larry Adelman, fullback, a brother of Ollie Adelman, a Wildcat star of several years ago.
