Both Miss Phansiehl and Mr. Geppert are students in the School of Music at Northwestern University and Mr. Geppert will receive his Master's degree in music next month.

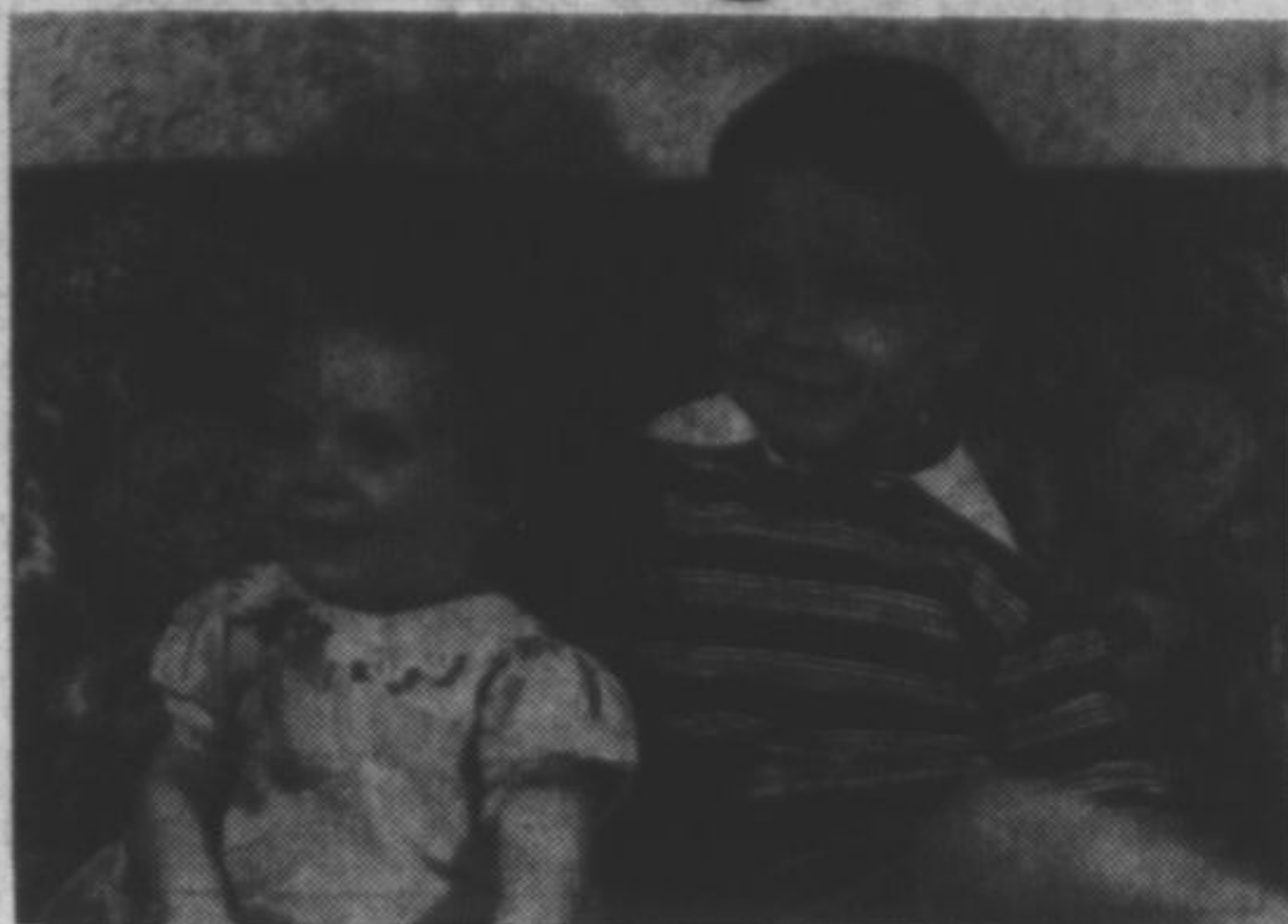
Mrs. Mason Smith Heads Ravinia PTA Group
