

Robert Cameron Smith Completes His Basic Training with 95.2

Completing his basic training with a grade average of 95.2, Robert J. Cameron-Smith, 29, of 612 Lincoln Ave., Highland Park was named an honor man in the graduating class of the Hospital Corps School at the U. S. Naval Training Station here today.

Cameron-Smith was one of a class of 442 sailors from 30 states to complete a course in anatomy, physiology, hygiene and sanitation, first aid, weights and measures and materia-medica.

He has been promoted to hospital apprentice, second class, and now will be sent to a Naval hospital for additional training before being assigned to general duty at sea or at a shore station.

Cameron-Smith was graduated from New Trier High School in Winnetka in 1930 and attended Oberlin College in Ohio. He is married and his wife lives in Highland Park. He enlisted in the Navy recently as an apprentice seaman and was chosen for the Hospital Corps School by special selection examination.

He was presented a certificate of graduation by Captain A. B. Davidson, Ninth Naval District medical officer, at exercises held at the school. Captain T. DeWitt Carr, executive officer of the station, and Captain F. H. Lash, senior chaplain, spoke at the graduation ceremony.

The Art Class: where spatter prints, water colors, crayon sketches, finger painting and oil painting are taught and practiced. Sewing & Home Making: is a class that will include activities in sewing, cooking, baking, knitting, and table serving.
