A quota of 5,200 Ravinia Festival coupon books has been set for sale before July 5, it was announced today by Mrs. Ernst C. von Ammon of Winnetka, general chairman of the coupon book committee. The 1942 Ravinia season of "Music Under the Stars" opens Tuesday evening, June 30.

The Ravinia Festival's chief support is derived from the sale of coupon books, which cost \$10 each and contain 18 coupons, good for either gate admissions or reserved seats at any regular concert. This year the government has added a tax of \$1.44. Coupon books represent a saving of \$3.86 over the same number of single admissions.

While the coupon book sale is getting under way under the direction of Mrs. von Ammon, members of the park committee are putting the finishing touches on the landscaping and the famous petunia bed.

The old stadium in the north meadow has been taken down and 600 new free seats have been added on the southwest side of the pavilion to match the seats added at the northwest corner last season.

The amplifying system installed last year on a test basis, and praised by the public and the music critics, has been permanently added to Ravinia properties. Music can now be heard well in any corner of the park.

Transportation Solved
A plan for Ravinia transportation has been advanced by Percy B. Eckhart, Kenilworth, chairman of the Ravinia Festival Association. Eckhart recommends "car pooling" for Ravinia as advocated by the Government to cut down tire and gasoline usage. Community chairmen will supply names of persons in the same neighborhoods who are Ravinia patrons and are interested in sharing rides.

Bicycle racks have also been installed on Ravinia grounds for the many suburbanites who will use that form of transportation.

The many service men stationed on the North Shore will be admitted to the park for thirty cents, the same price children under twelve years will pay. In addition, blocks of Ravinia park admissions are being bought by Ravinia patrons to give to soldiers and sailors.

The Chicago Symphony will play for the first six weeks of the Festival. Conductors will be Dimitri Mitropoulos, George Szell, Eugene Ormandy, Artur Rodzinski, and Pierre Monteux. The seventh week will be devoted to four concerts by the Budapest String Quartet.

Soloists
Soloists for the 1942 season will be Artur Schnabel, celebrated pianist; Joseph Szigeti, violinist; and Gregor Piatigorsky, cellist. Szigeti and Piatigorsky will appear as soloists individually and will also join forces for a performance of the Brahms Double Concerto for Violin and Cello. Emanuel Feuermann had been scheduled to appear earlier, but his untimely death necessitated the change.

League Favors Lowered Income Tax Exemptions

Lowered income tax exemptions rather than a general sales tax is being urged by the National League of Women Voters. The National League President, Miss Marguerite M. Wells said in a letter to members of the House Ways and Means Committee: "We realize that a sales tax might ultimately become necessary in order to reach the inflationary funds in the hands of low income groups, but it should not be used until an effort has been made to accomplish this purpose by a graduated income tax. The League favors a tax bill with provisions for collecting the bulk of income taxes on wage earning and salaried persons at the source." In regard to the proposed joint income tax return, the National League of Women Voters is urging that the issue be considered not on the basis of a "Woman's Rights" but rather as a means of closing tax loopholes.
