Men Needed In Signal Corps of Army

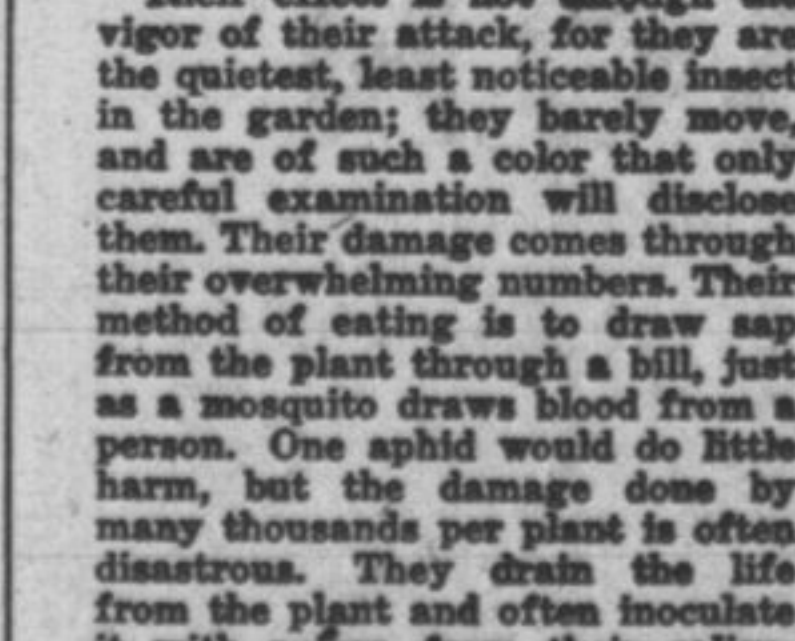

WAR GARDEN INSECT SERIES—No. 4

Garden Enemy No. 1—The Aphid There is no vegetable immune from attack by aphids and almost no crop but what suffers appreciable loss thereby. In our war effort to produce food, the aphid is on the side of the enemy and we must combat it by spraying as soon as any of those little green or pinkish insects are seen in our gardens.

gardeners will hold the line against attack. Probably the best advice on this is given by the United States Department of Agriculture when they say, "When aphids are found, do not wait to find out whether or not it is going to increase. Spray at once with nicotine sulphate."



Wet the aphid with this solution and they will be killed by the contact and also by fumes given off from the spray. A second or third coverage may be necessary if the infestation is heavy.

The main thing to remember is to get the Black Leaf 40 going the minute the tiny aphid is seen on any plants in the garden. Here, if ever, is proved the adage that a "stick in time saves nine."
