When the 1942 Ravinia Festival completes its first week Sunday (July 5) the opportunity to buy money-saving coupon books will be withdrawn, according to Mrs. Ernst C. von Ammon, general chairman of the coupon book committee, and Ravinia concertgoers will have to pay full single admission prices for both gate tickets and reserve seats.

The coupon books have been on sale since May 26 by more than 400 women working under community chairmen, and are still available from committee members 2nd at a number of North Shore banks, Chicago stores, and at the park itself.

Sunday (July 5) will also end Dimitri Mitropoulos' debut engagement at the North Shore park and the following Tuesday (July 7) will bring back to Ravinia George Szell, the Hungarian conductor who was so successful last year that he has been engaged for both the second and third weeks this year.

Mitropoulos will conduct on Thursday (July 2), on Saturday evening, the 4th of July, and will finish his engagement on Sunday, July 5.

Mr. Szell will take over the baton on Tuesday evening (July 7) with a popular program consisting of the Tchaikovsky Sixth Symphony, and two works by Wagner, "A Siegfried Idyl" and the prelude to "The Mastersingers of Nuremberg."

He will appear again on Thursday (July 9) and on Saturday (July 11) will present Artur Schnabel as piano soloist. He has also scheduled the only young people's concert of the season for Sunday afternoon, when he will devote the program to the more familiar items of the symphonic repertoire loved alike by young and old.

## How to include the ONE HOT DISH every summer meal should have

GRANNIE had what granddad called "notions about food." One of them was that every meal should include some hot food—especially in summer time. "It's just good sense," she'd say. "Hot food keeps you feeling better."

Well, that's one notion of Grannie's that's heartily endorsed by today's nutrition experts. For hot food definitely aids the flow of gastric juices and helps keep digestions contented.

Soup is one of the easiest of all ways to get hot food into a meal. It takes but a minute or two to prepare and it certainly perks up languid appetites. Just open a can of your favorite soup, add an equal quantity of water, heat—and there you are.

Or you might combine two soups in this manner:

- Southern Tomato Soup**
- 1 can condensed tomato soup
  - 1 can condensed chicken gumbo soup
  - 1 cup water, using soup can for measure
  - 1 can fresh milk, using soup can for measure
- Mix the chicken gumbo soup into the tomato soup. Then add the milk and water. Heat, but do not boil. Serves 4-7.

Perhaps, though, you wish to start the meal with a long cool glass of chilled tomato juice. All right—then serve your hot dish right after that. It might be something on the order of this:

- Swedish Meat Balls with Tomato Sauce**
- 1 pound veal, ground
  - 1 pound pork, ground
  - 1/4 teaspoon salt
  - 1/4 teaspoon sage
  - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
  - 1 onion, grated
  - 1/2 cup bread crumbs
  - 1 egg
  - 1/2 cup milk
- Mix all ingredients together. Roll into meat balls (18-20) and brown in fat. Add hot Tomato Sauce, cover and cook for one hour. Serve meat balls with sauce poured over them. Serves 6.
- Tomato Sauce**
- 1 can condensed tomato soup
  - 1 cup water
- Add the water to the condensed tomato soup and heat to boiling. Pour over the browned meat balls.

## Chicago Opera to Sponsor Two Performances In Soldier's Field

As though not content to break its long silence with mere announcement of a regular season this fall, the Chicago Opera Company today followed that announcement with news that it will sponsor two open-air performances this summer - both major musical events - both to be given at Soldier's Field.

The first event will be a concert by Lily Pons, world-famous coloratura soprano of the Chicago and Metropolitan opera companies, to be given in conjunction with her distinguished conductor husband, Andre Kostelanetz and symphony orchestra. This event will take place on Friday evening July 31, in Soldier's Field. Chicagoans still remember the night that the diminutive French diva and her husband drew an estimated 300,000 to Grant Park for a summer concert with a vocal range that starts at middle C in the lower register and goes to A above C, Miss Pons is a vocal phenomenon. She sings the highest note of any of the celebrated prima donnas of this, or any other, age.

The second event to be sponsored by the Chicago Opera Company at Soldier's Field will be an open-air opera performance to be presented on Saturday night, August 8. Details of this performance will be announced within a few days. Since the St. Louis Municipal Opera, the Hollywood Bowl and the Cincinnati Summer Opera all draw large audiences, the Chicago Opera Company for some time has been anxious to inaugurate a program of outdoor opera here. This opera performance will be the most colorful musical spectacle ever seen in Chicago, and is expected to duplicate the outdoor operas which Fortune Gallo - now general director of the Chicago Company - produced at Jones Beach and Sheep's Head Bay in New York - the latter drawing an audience of 50,000 people. Mr. Gallo and Harry Zelzer will be in charge of

the two performances - Mr. Gallo as general director, Mr. Zelzer as promotion manager.

For both performances, a part of Soldier's Field will be transformed into a giant opera amphitheatre. A stage will be set up at the north end, fully equipped with scenery from the Chicago Opera Company's extensive warehouses. Surrounding this stage will be 30,000 seats priced at 55c, \$1.10 and \$1.65. The \$1.10 and \$1.65 seats will be reserved, 55c seats will be located in the general admission (not reserved) section. Due to the fact that thousands of audience seats can be made available, Chicagoans thus will have the privilege for the first time in the city's history - of hearing top-ranking stars of the operatic world at popular prices.

Tickets for both events - the concert and the opera - will go on sale July 10 at the Civic Opera House, 20 North Wacker Drive. Arrangements are being made to set up a special box office to take care of ticket sales for these two unique summer attractions which, in reality, constitute the Chicago Opera Company's first "summer season." Mail orders are being filled now.

"We feel it's a privilege" said Mrs. James G. MacMillan, president of the Guild, "to participate in these two important Soldier's Field events. I hope that next fall will see regular performances of the Chicago Opera Company dotted with men in uniform, whose presence at the opera has been made possible by the Guild's recreation fund for servicemen." The boxes, seating six persons, will sell for \$13.20.
