MUST USE SUGAR SUBSTITUTES

In Quick Breads containing only a small amount of sugar (% cup) use white corn syrup or honey in place of the sugar. In recipes with more sugar, substitute for % sugar and reduce the liquid as in cake (see below). Add syrup or honey with egg and liquid if "muffin" method is used. If "cake" method, beat it into shortening and sugar as for cakes.

In Yeast Doughs Use white corn syrup or honey in place of sugar (same amount). If dough seems sticky to handle use a little extra flour.

In Custard-Type Desserts In custards, cornstarch and bread puddings, in cream pie fillings, etc., use corn syrup or honey in place of sugar (same amount) and reduce liquid % cup for each cup of syrup or honey used.

In Cannod Fruit or Berry Pies White syrup can be substituted for % the sugar if the liquid (juice) is reduced 4 thep. per cup of syrup. In Fresh Fruit or Berry Pies

Where liquid cannot be reduced, light corn syrup can also be substituted for 1/2 the sugar; but the flour must be increased 4 thsp. for each cup of syrup used. In Cookies

Use 1/4 the usual amount of sugar called for to cream with the shortening. Substitute corn syrup for the remaining sugar . . . beating it into the creamed shortening and sugar very gradually and thoroughly before blending in the eggs. Dark syrup may be used in chocolate, spice and ginger cookies; but light cookies require the white syrup. In all cases, reduce the liquid ¼ cup for each cup of syrup used. In recipes that contain less than ¼ cup liquid, increase the flour until the dough will handle according to directions. Chill dough.

In Butter Cakes Use % the amount of sugar called for to cream with the shortening. Substitute white corn syrup for the remaining sugar called for. (Dark syrup may be used in chocolate, molasses, and spice cakes . . . but we cannot guarantee perfect results in light cakes unless pure white syrup is used.) Beat syrup into creamed shortening and sugar very gradually and thoroughly before gradually beating in well beaten eggs (use large eggs). Reduce the liquid ¼ cup for each cup of syrup used. In Egg White Cakes, fold in stiffly beaten whites (beaten just /before adding) quickly and gently.

NOTE: In measuring syrup, take care to measure level (not over-full). Syrup is apt to round up a bit due to surface tension. Grease pans extra well. Cakes made with syrup are especially moist. Test carefully to be sure cake is thoroughly baked.
