Your Gas Company is replacing 3 1/2 miles of three-inch gas main originally laid to supply Liberty. The newly eight-inch feeder line is being laid on Rockland Road, Lake Bluff, from Greenbay Road west to Waukegan Road, and south to Deerpath, Lake Forest, connecting to the existing six-inch feeder line to the Deerfield Holder Station. This new construction required a priority from our Government and will cost approximately \$50,000. The Gas Company will not derive any additional revenue from this new feeder line which is being laid to increase the gas supply to customers from Lake Bluff south to the southern city limits of Winnetka.

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 cup molasses
- 3 cups sifted enriched flour
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon ginger
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup sour milk
- 1 cup raisins

Cream together shortening and sugar. Beat egg and add. Add molasses and mix thoroughly. Sift together flour, soda, baking powder, ginger, and salt. Add to creamed mixture alternately with sour milk. Add raisins. Drop by teaspoonfuls on greased baking sheet. Bake in moderately hot oven (400° F.) about 10 minutes.

Yield: 7 1/2 dozen 2-inch cookies.
