Tire Inventories For September Must Be Filed By October 15

Inventories of tires and tubes for the quarter ending Sept. 30, must be filed not later than Oct. 15, Michael F. Mulcahy, OPA director of the Chicago Metropolitan area, has announced.

Revised inventory blanks, Form R-17, have been mailed to all dealers in the Chicago area and can also be obtained from the local rationing boards.

Persons who have already received these forms by mail, who have never sold or held for sale tires and tubes or motor vehicles, or retired from that business prior to July 1, 1942, should file these forms with a statement of the circumstances in order that the official records may be corrected.

The dealers affected are (1) persons selling or holding for sale, new tires or tubes, retreaded or recapped tires or used tires or tubes; (2) Every person selling or holding for sale motor vehicles; (3) Every person extending to another upon the security of a motor vehicle under an agreement permitting the lender to take possession of the motor vehicle which includes finance companies and individuals.

Reports Issued For Month By Rationing Boards

Reports have been issued for the month of September by the rationing boards of Highland Park and Highwood as follows:

In Highland Park there were 466 applications for sugar for canning purposes made by 1,635 persons and a total of 8,158 pounds were issued. Highwood had 116 applications and 2,984 pounds were issued.

Grade 1 Tires

Highland Park issued six grade 1 tires to the following: U. S. post office, 2; Dr. Livingston, 1; Chaplain Moss of Fort Sheridan, 1; city of Highland Park police department, 2, and 2 grade two tires. Thirty-three passenger car tubes were issued and 35 passenger car recaps. A truck tire, 2 tubes and 1 retread were given the Railway Express. Two applications were made for new automobiles and one issued to E. D. Dickerman of 1922 Flora place, who is superintendent of Payne and Dolan, Inc., a defense plant. Bicycles were given George King and Irwin Tolle.

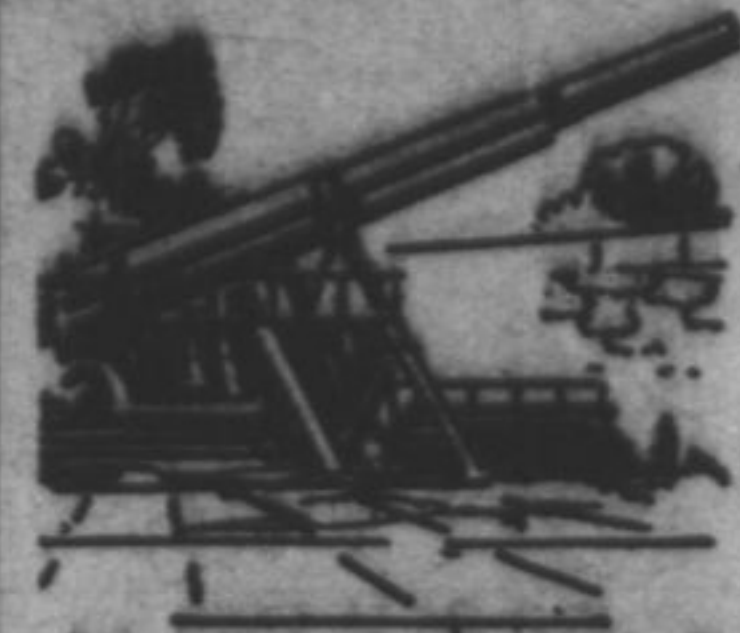
Successful Year Is Reported by Thrift Shop
