North Shore Cars Carry War Bond Signs In Colors

Four merchandise dispatch cars of the Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee — the North Shore Line — painted in red, white and blue and carrying large "Buy U. S. War Bonds" slogans on their sides, have enlisted for the duration as "traveling salesmen" in the United States Treasury department's campaign to sell war savings bonds.

All four cars operate daily between Chicago and Milwaukee and are visible not only to the people of those cities but also to residents of more than 20 other large communities served by the railroad.

Below the signs "Buy U. S. War Bonds," the cars are painted blue. The signs are white, with blue letters, and the top portions of the cars are red.
