

### Graduates Of Local Navigation Class In Service

The Highland Park navigation class that was conducted in the Public library this last spring and summer produced several graduates who are now in the service.

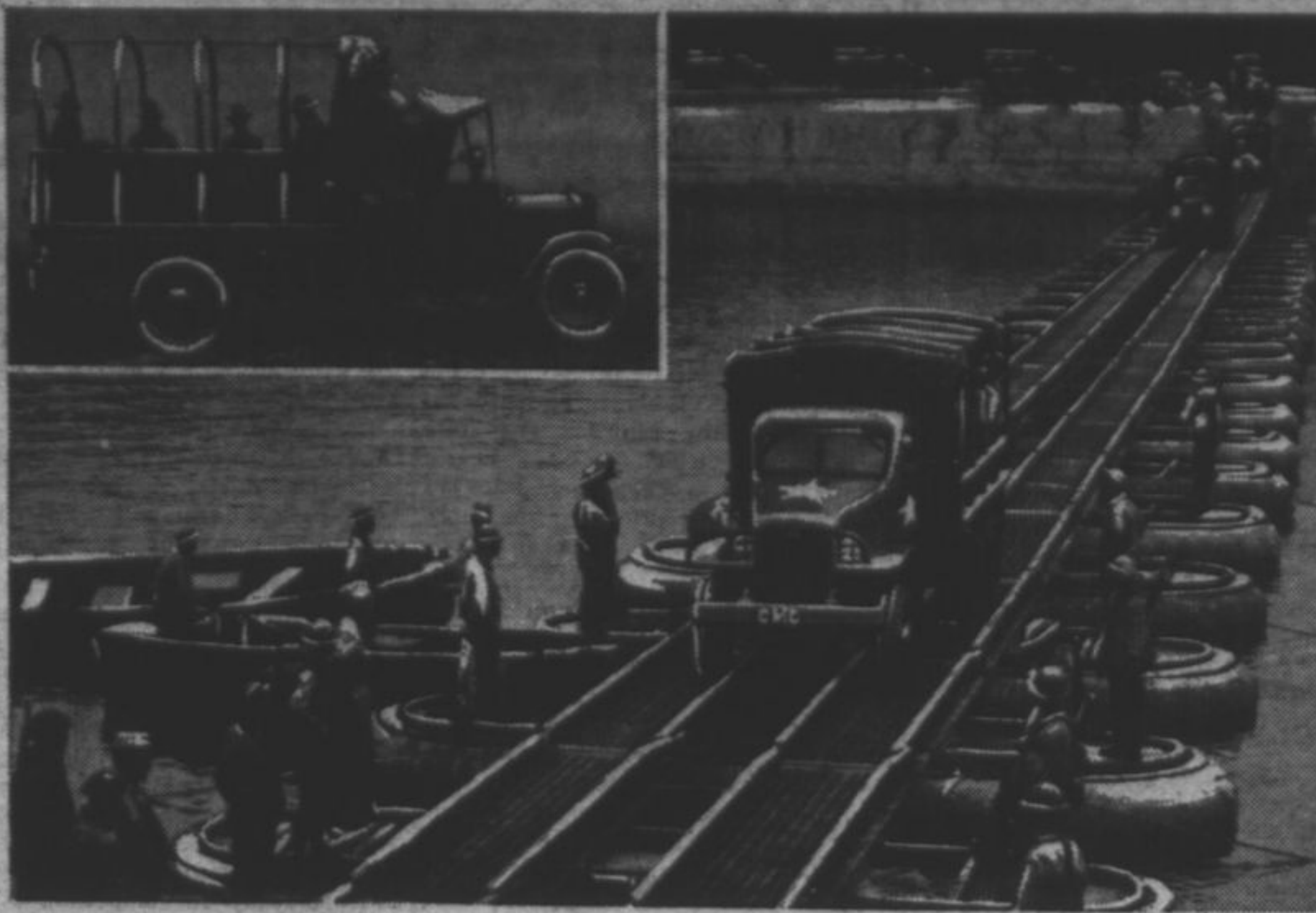

Doughnuts are just right for fall meals. Just right because they're made with Wilson's Bake-Rite. Whether you make doughnuts, cookies or cake, you'll want to know how to make them with substitutes in place of rationed sugar. These simple rules will help you.

#### The "Baking" Rule for Baking Sugarless Goodies

In making cakes and cookies, use Bake-Rite with your favorite recipe. Substitute syrup for sugar (cup for cup) and cut down the other liquid called for by one-third. Or substitute honey (cup for cup) but use only one-half of the other liquids. If sorghum is your substitute, then use 1/4 teaspoon soda to replace 2 teaspoons baking powder, and cut down other listed liquid by one-third. If the soda isn't equal in leavening power to the baking powder as given in the original recipe, add enough baking powder to take care of the difference.

For sugarless icing, cook over hot water, 1 cup tart jelly, 2 unbeaten egg whites, dash of salt. Beat until smooth.
