"Vote as you please—but vote" is the usual motto for this year's election scheduled to take place on Tuesday, Nov. 3.

For the benefit of voters, the following is a complete list of candidates in the election:

County Offices

County judges: Perry L. Persons of Waukegan, Republican, present incumbent. He has served as a County judge for the past 31 years and has served on numerous welfare boards locally, throughout the state and nationally. Philip W. Yager, Waukegan, Democrat. He has been a practicing lawyer in Lake County for the past 8 1/2 years and was assistant attorney general for Lake County from Sept. 1939, until April, 1941.

County clerk: Ivan R. Harlow, Zion, Democrat. He has just completed two years on the Lake County Board of Review and served for three years on the Zion board of education. Jay B. Served as city treasurer of North Chicago, 1937-1941, city alderman, 1941, precinct committee man since 1932, secretary of the Lake County Democratic Central committee for 8 terms, still serving as state automobile investigator.

Coordinators Work On Tabulating of All Riding Groups

While it is not possible to place every motorist in a driving group—due in many cases to the time of arrival and departure—it is the committee's intention to keep their records current so that when a possibility arises, they will be in position to promptly advise the parties affected, of the group possibilities. Motorists are urged to report any change of schedules to the committee, or if they have not sent back the transportation survey to do so promptly.

George Cichon, U.S. Navy, To Speak At War Bond Rally

FORMER MAYOR, S. M. HASTINGS, DIES AT AGE 82

Samuel Miles Hastings, former mayor of Highland Park, died Friday afternoon in his home at 812 Waverly road of a heart attack at the age of 82.

Mr. Hastings was born in Rimersburg, Pa., Aug. 14, 1860, the son of Ely and Rachael Whitehall Hastings. In 1865 the family moved to Gardner, Ill.

Mr. Hastings began his business career as a clerk in a dry goods store at Broadwood. In 1879, at the age of 19, he had acquired an active interest in a retail dry goods store there. He moved to Streator in 1884, where he was in business for five years. Since 1889 he has been a factor in the commercial and industrial life of Chicago, traveling on business in Europe. On his return to Chicago he engaged in the manufacture and sale of computing scales, organizing the Computing Scale company of America, holding company for the Dayton Scale company, which in 1911 became one of the three divisions of the newly formed Computing, Tabulating, Recording company with Mr. Hastings as one of the directors.

The name of the company was changed in 1924 to International Business Machines company and for many years Mr. Hastings was president of the Dayton Scale company division of the company and a director of the company. He would have celebrated his 50th year in the business next year.

Mr. Hastings was a prominent citizen of Highland Park for many years and was mayor of the city for twelve years, from 1915 to 1928. For a number of years he was president of the board of trustees of the Highland Park Presbyterian church and chairman of the board of the Highland Park State bank, honorary member of the Highland Park Rotary club and honorary chairman of the Community Chest.

He was a member of the Chicago Athletic association, Old Elm Country club, Exmoor Country club, Sons of the American Revolution and many other civic and social organizations.

In 1881 he married Jeannette Rankin of Broadwood. She died in 1922. In

George Cichon, United States navy, will appear as guest speaker at the War Bond rally to be held at the Elm Place school auditorium Saturday evening, Oct. 31, from 8 to 9:30 o'clock. The rally is being sponsored by the War Bond committee of Highland Park which is headed by Ralph Davidson.

George Cichon, gunner's mate, 3rd class, was born in Chicago twenty-one years ago. Two years ago, at the age of nineteen, he enlisted in the United States navy. He was at Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7. He has participated in the battles of Coral Sea, Midway and the first invasion of the Solomons, two months ago.

A member of the crew of the ill-fated U. S. Cruiser Astoria, George Cichon saw his ship set afire and sunk. When the ship was set afire, the crew had to flood its magazine. The fire raged amidships and a portion of the crew was stranded on the bow while the others remained on the stern.

Describing this scene, Cichon says: "Our power units were disabled and we were left drifting aimlessly away from the battle. Waiting for the dawn so we could get ourselves located, it seemed that the night would never end."

In the morning a destroyer approached—later orders were given to abandon the sinking ship—Cichon and his fellow seamen had to swim through shark-infested waters to the destroyer that stood by for their rescue.

Home on Furlough
Cichon, who lives at 2721 South Kostner avenue, Chicago, is visiting relatives, and is home on a thirty-day furlough. During his spare time he is busy urging the "people back home" to back up the boys by buying more war bonds. In the message he has brought back from his shipmates, Cichon says: "It's short, but simple and sweet—remember us, as we never forget you. It's heartening to know how much you're backing us up, for it's the 'folks back home' who are first in our thoughts!"

"Anyone who thinks he might possibly mark his ballot wrong on Nov. 3, should see 'The Fight for Honest Ballots,' a movie produced by the Better Government Association. The permanent registration card system in operation is another feature of the movie, which also shows how slight a slip can cause a ballot to be discarded by the election judges. A cross, for instance, is the only way the circles next to the candidates' and parties' names on the ballot may be marked. If a check (V) is made instead, the ballot is immediately thrown out.
