Chairman of the Commission on Justice and Peace of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, Isserman was largely responsible for the platform adopted by this body for a post-war peace program The principles of brotherhood which he has plead for all mankind, he has by actual practice established in his relationships in St. Louis, where he heads the work of Temple Israel, the Round Table of Jews and Christians, and a number of civic enterprises.
