

WHO'S NEWS THIS WEEK

NEW YORK.—In this war, it appears that newly appointed commanders always look more promising than the men they succeed.

When Vice Admiral William F. Halsey Jr. replaced Vice Admiral Robert L. Ghormley in command of the Solomon Islands action, we took a couple of days to look for a professionally informed and disinterested appraisal of Admiral Halsey's qualifications for his critically important job.

As an officer, his emphasis, and his proven ability, has been in adaptiveness and mobility. With Rear Admirals John H. Towers and Arthur B. Cook, he has combined the skills and furthered the techniques of men who, like himself, can both sail and fly.

He once said: "I believe in violating rules. We violate them every day. We do the unexpected."

At the age of 66, he pilots his own plane and gets close in where action is real or impending. He is one of the most experienced men in the navy in operations such as those in the Solomons today, having been awarded the Distinguished Service medal for planning and carrying through the raids in the Marshall and Gilbert Islands.

Admiral Halsey was born and grew up in Elizabeth, N. J., and entered Annapolis in 1900. He rode destroyers for a few years and later was a member of the Annapolis executive staff.

ABOUT two years ago, the British discovered that their industrial tempo was set to the pace of "Auld Lang Syne," or "Comin' Through the Rye."

Former Secretary Of Indian Congress Speaks In Wilmette

On Sunday night, Nov. 15, Tarini Prasad Sinha will be the speaker at the North Shore Sunday Evening club at New Trier high school, Wilmette.

He is former secretary of the London Bureau of the Indian National congress and a personal friend of Mahatma Gandhi with whom he made his home for two or three years.

He will discuss the whole Indian question and at the close a forum will be conducted in which everyone may ask questions inspired by his lecture.

While Secretary for the Indian National Congress at London, he traveled and lectured widely throughout Europe, and later toured the United States. For some time he was engaged in special capacities in the Secretariat of the League of Nations at Geneva, Switzerland.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

"Adam and Fallen Man" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, November 8.

The Golden Text was, "As by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by the obedience of one shall many be made righteous" (Romans 5:19).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord; and he delighteth in his way. Though he fall, he shall not be utterly cast down; for the Lord upholdeth him with his hand. The law of his God is in his heart; none of his steps shall slide." (Psalms 37: 23, 24, 31).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "Life is, always has been, and ever will be independent of matter; for Life is God, and man is the idea of God, not formed materially but spiritually, and not subject to decay and dust. The great truth in the Science of being, that the real man was, is, and ever shall be perfect. He is inconvertible; for if man is the image, reflection, of God, he is neither inverted nor subverted, but upright and Godlike" (p. 200).
