Field Museum Presents Layman Lecture Dec. 13

Tour conductor for this strange (and, of course, imaginary) journey will be Paul G. Dallwig, the museum's "layman lecturer." The dramatization of such a trip, and of the fantastic conditions the travelers would encounter, is a feature of his lecture, "Mysterious 'Night-Riders' of the Sky," in which he will also tell the principal facts about comets, meteors, and meteorites. The museum's meteorite collection, most comprehensive in the world, will be used to illustrate the lecture.

Wildcats and Irish Meet At Stadium December 12

It was only a year ago that the Chicago Stadium, became the site of a full, big-time college basketball schedule, but already this newest of cage arenas has become the adopted child of the oldest college rivalry in the middle west—the traditional Northwestern-Notre Dame classic.

When the Wildcats and Irish tangle on December 12 it will mark their 31st meeting since the series started back in 1927. They will meet again this season in the Stadium on January 16.

DePaul, which snared home team honors with Northwestern at the Stadium, meets Purdue in the second half of the opening doubleheader.

The Wildcats and Irish had met a few times prior to 1927, but the real rivalry dates back to the season Dutch Lonberg took over the N. U. reins. Since then the teams have played twice each year.

So keen has the competition been in this series, that the two schools even disagree on the number of games won and lost. The Wildcats claim 13 victories as against 17 defeats, while the Irish accept the 17 victories, but hold fast to their record book, which shows 12 defeats and one tie.

The discrepancy is due to the famous 21-20 (Northwestern version) game in 1935. The battle ended with the official scorebook showing the Wildcats ahead by one point. A recheck showed the score was 20-20 (Notre Dame version), but the recount came too late for a playoff and the Wildcats claimed the victory. The Irish still insist it was a tie game.

As additional proof of the keen rivalry between the two teams, only a matter of 44 points separates their total scoring in the 30 games played.

Only twice in its entire history has a game been a complete runaway. Notre Dame walloped the Cats, 56-27 in 1939, while Northwestern doubled the Irish score in 1936, 38-19.

At the end of this our first year of fighting for our democratic way of life, it is gratifying to read the life of a man who lived a courageous life in times much like our own. Yes, I refer to that most powerful writer of modern France—Victor Hugo. His biographer, Matthew Josephson, who you will remember as author of the widely read "Robber Barons," gives us a vivid and realistic picture of a man who is still an inspiration to us today. When dictatorship reigned in France, Hugo was known to exclaim: "I don't know how long this eclipse will last; yet he was as certain as he was alive that 'daylight would return and the people and God triumph'."

The timelessness of this masterpiece is only one reason why you cannot fail to read this absorbing biography. Good books have not been rationed! Your library has a goodly stock of the finer ones of contemporary interest none the least of which is: "The Twilight of France" brought to us by the author of "Moscow Diary"—Alexander Werth. This book deals with the last years of the French Republic—1933-40. You will get a keener insight into the beginnings of Vichy government, and into the confusion and weaknesses of French politics.

"The Roots of American Culture" by Constance Rourke was originally intended to be a three volume work before her death in 1941. For this history of American culture she had prepared herself with 30 years of research in every phase of her subject. This would probably have been the masterpiece of modern American social interpretation. We give it to you unfinished as it is because it represents the importance and scope of her findings and reveals much "of the rich store of American tradition."

For the Yuletide season you will enjoy the modern Christmas story by Lucille Papin Borden "The Shining Tree." In the unique setting of a Pennsylvania station in New York, we see Christian kindness reaching out to a refugee child of six.

Marcia Davenport's new novel for which you have been waiting is here. Seven decades of American life are seen in "The Valley of Decision." It is a novel of love and devotion, loyalty and self-sacrifice.

Gallagher, Ebsen Play to Good Crowds At Blackstone

Richard Gallagher and Christian Rudolph Ebsen, better known respectively as Skeets and Buddy, have considerable in common.

Both clattered out of the sticks to make their first big hits on Broadway, both graduated to the films, both are genial comedians, and both are sharing current billing at the Blackstone where they are playing in the unhibited frolic "Good Night Ladies!"
