Kelso Cole, Class '43, To Graduate Dec. 18 From Bradley Tech

Henry Kelso Coale III, son of Mrs. Grace Coale, of Highland Park is among the thirty seniors to be graduated from Bradley Polytechnic institute in Peoria on Friday, Dec. 19. He will receive a B.S. degree at this time.

This class, the first to be graduated from Bradley in mid-year, is a part of the class of 1943. Its members are receiving their diplomas six months ahead of the usual peace-time schedule because they entered the wartime accelerated program of the college last spring and studied through the summer. This program reduces the time required to attain a degree by one third.

John Williams Hughes, British radio commentator, lecturer, and writer will speak at commencement, which will be held at 3:30 P.M. on the subject "An Outsider Looks At American Democracy." The Rev. Eldon G. Lindberg will preach at baccalaureate services to be held Sunday, Dec. 13 in the college chapel.

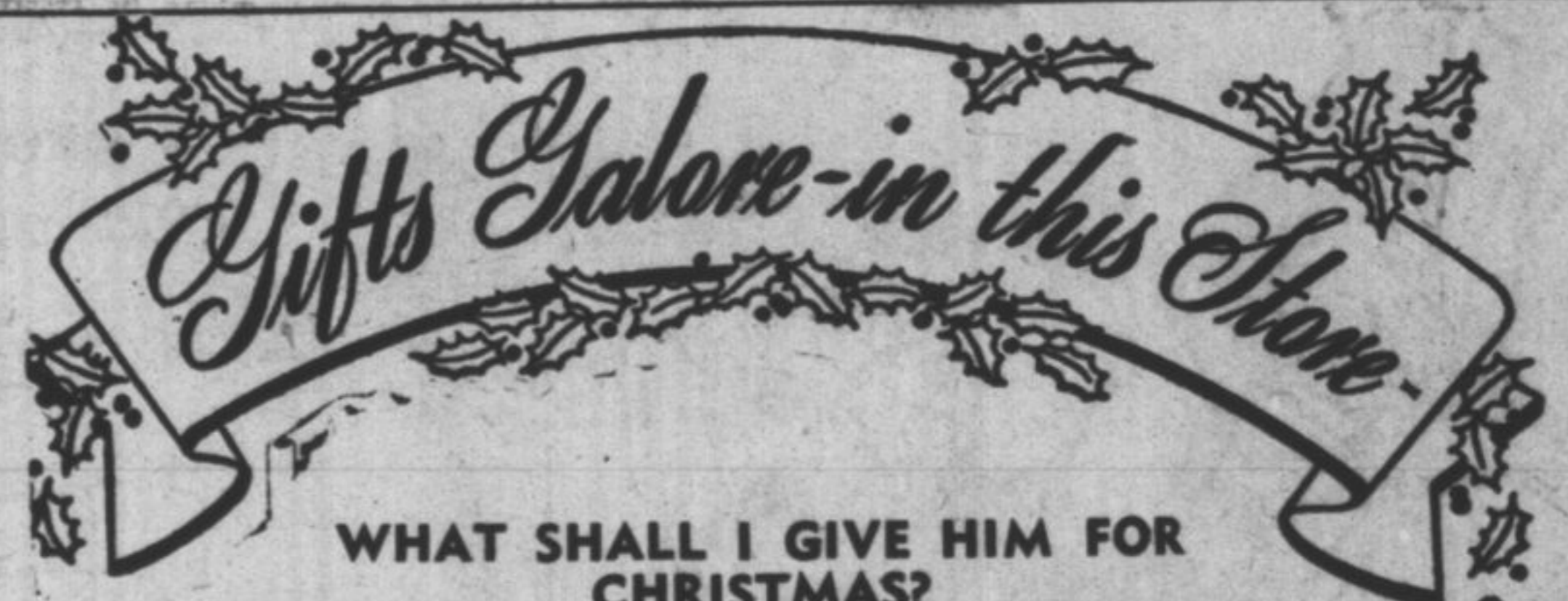
