Motor Transport Course Offered For Women

The Adult Education department of the Highland Park high school will offer a course in motor transport for women during the second term which starts on Jan. 11. This course will be conducted by Harry Bolle of the high school faculty. Mr. Bolle teaches the work in auto shop for the day school students.

Mr. Bolle has announced that this course is definitely not a course in driving instruction, but rather one that will acquaint women with the various parts of the motor and teach them to do simple repair work.

List Jobs

Some of the jobs to be taken up in this course are (1) The testing and care of automobile batteries. (2) How to change tires on the road. (3) How to patch inner tubes. (4) How to grease cars with a pressure greaser. (5) How to check oil in the crankcase. (6) Checking and cleaning spark plugs. (7) How to check the ignition system. (8) Cleaning and replacing points. (9) Adjusting and replacing fan belts. (10) Checking hydraulic brakes. (11) Brake adjustments. (12) How to add brake fluid. (13) Testing anti-freeze. (14) Testing tire pressure. (15) Carburetor adjustments. (16) Use of the common tools necessary in auto repair. (17) Simple soldering. (18) An acquaintance with the function and various parts of the car.

Persons may register for this course by calling the high school on any Monday or Wednesday evening until Dec. 16. In case the class can take more members, registrations may be made on Monday or Wednesday evening, Jan. 4 or 6. The course will start on Wednesday evening, Jan. 13.

Need Women For Executive Positions With Army Ordnance
