The use of these coupons has been . divided into five periods. Following are the facts applicable to the use of these coupons:

All grades of burning oils and keroseries have been under ration since last October 1.

1. Therefore, Stamp No. 1 may be used up to and including December 16.

2. Stamp No. 2 is valid from December 3 to January 6, but may be used until January 19. 3. No. 3 may be used from January 6 to February 22.

4. Stamp No. 4 from February 7 to March 26.

5. Stamp No. 5 from March 13 to September 30, 1943, This over-lap period accorded to

each fuel oil ration stamp is to allow ample time for its use and to further prevent last minute rush buying. It is possible to use both No. 1 and No. 2 between this date and December 16 affecting savings to users by larger deliveries as well as saving rubber and manpower by less frequent deliveries.
