**Use of Fuel Oil Ration Coupons Explained by O. P. A.**

The recent sudden cold weather brought an avalanche of inquiries to the central office of the metropolitan area of the OPA from individuals in nearly every part of the Chicago area asking information regarding the period of validity of fuel oil ration coupons and the periods they may be used.

The use of these coupons has been divided into five periods. Following are the facts applicable to the use of these coupons:

All grades of burning oils and kerosenes have been under ration since last October 1.

1. Therefore, Stamp No. 1 may be used up to and including December 16.
2. Stamp No. 2 is valid from December 3 to January 6, but may be used until January 19.
3. No. 3 may be used from January 6 to February 22.
4. Stamp No. 4 from February 7 to March 26.
5. Stamp No. 5 from March 13 to September 30, 1943.

This over-lap period accorded to each fuel oil ration stamp is to allow ample time for its use and to further prevent last minute rush buying. It is possible to use both No. 1 and No. 2 between this date and December 16 affecting savings to users by larger deliveries as well as saving rubber and manpower by less frequent deliveries.

Last season Mills moulded together a team of four sophomores and a senior, and went on to win the conference bunting with 13 victories in 15 games. This season his four sophomores are now juniors with a full year's experience to their credit, and Doug has replaced his only missing regular with Art Mathisen, a Senior center.

Two years ago, Mathisen was the Illini's regular center. Last season Art lost his job to Vic Wukovitz, who graduated in June, and is now serving in the Navy. With the former South Bend athlete out of the picture, Mathisen is back at his old station and turning in a creditable job.

Andy Phillips, who was voted one of the Big Ten's best guards in the coaches poll last March, heads the returning "Whiz Kids." The other three are Ken Menke, Jack Smiley, and Gene Vance.

With five veterans returning to Mills this season, it is no wonder Ohio State's Harold Olsen said here recently, "It looks like the other nine Big Ten teams will have to spend the season playing for second place."
