H. P. Public Library New Books at the Highland Park Public Library

Today every one turns for comfort to books of former and less turbulent times.

Among the delightful new books which have been published are: Julian Green's *Memoirs of Happy Days in Paris*, with his family, parents and four sisters. This is a delightful bit of writing by a sensitive person aware of the best that France had to offer. It is difficult to realize that the man who wrote *Morse Garden* is the author of this.

I Came Out of the Eighteenth Century—John A. Rice. Here is another book of life in America. Born in South Carolina, he spent part of his childhood on a plantation. He tells of his education in this country and at Oxford, his teaching in various institutions. His clever humor, often caricaturizations make this an amusing book.

Roots of American Culture—Constance Rourke. In the lengthy preface Van Wyck Brooks endeavors to explain the author's idea in writing this book, which was not completed at the time of her death. The book refutes the statement that the early settlers of this country were not interested in the development of architecture, music, painting, the fine arts in general. It also endeavors to place its finger on the elements which are distinctly American.

The Negro Caravan... This should be of interest not only to those who are interested in this minority problem, but to all who are interested in the cultural development of our country. This collection shows that the negro has, in making a distinct contribution to the literature, to the culture of our country. The book contains excerpts from James Weldon Johnson, Langston Hughes, Walter White, W. D. DuBois and many others.
