### Savings Committee Plans Follow-Up Bond Sales Campaign

Edward A. Reagan, chairman of the West Deerfield Township War Savings Committee, at a meeting on December 14, asked the aid of the township precinct committeemen on a follow-up campaign destined to increase war bond sales in the township.

The committee, Mr. Reagan states, is aware of the fact that many more sales have been made than have been accredited to the township, as a considerable number of citizens who have invested a goodly amount of their income in war bonds have been giving a Chicago business address instead of their Deerfield residence address. This deprives the township of just credit due. Plans were devised at the meeting whereby this situation can be remedied, and credit applied to the quota which has been assigned to West Deerfield Township.

Mrs. George Ubl, in charge of sales at the Deerfield Grammar school, reports that \$18.10 in stamps was purchased by grammar school children on the first day that the booth was open. They are hoping to increase this amount from week to week.

Letters from Third Class Shipfitter George Mailfold, U.S.N., to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Mailfold, indicate that he is stationed in Scotland. Previously employed by the Public Service Company, he enlisted in May.
