#### Lake County Will Furnish 3,500 Men For Army

Lake county will furnish an estimated 3,500 men for the armed forces next year as its part in meeting the national call for 31/2 million men. This averages about 300 men a month between 17 and 38 years of age.

This was estimated by draft officials who placed the state's total at 218,750 on the present demands.

Beginning next month, draft boards will begin calling up youths in the 18 and 19 year old bracket, but this group is not expected to fill the quotas, making it definite that childless married men will be called. The pool of unmarried men available for military ser-
