## Aaron B. Tart to Speak January 20 At Womens Ort

The North Shore chapter of the Women's American Ort will hold an open meeting on Wednesday, Jan. 20, at 8 p. m., at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Greenberg, 2169 Pine Point drive, Highland Park.

The speaker for the evening will be Aaron B. Tart, executive vice-chairman, American Ort federation. Mr. Tart has been active in social service work since his graduation from Columbia university and the Yale law school. Following several years of study of the economic problems of European Jewry, he became associated with the American Ort federation, whose aim is the economic rehabilitation of European Jews.

As executive vice-chairman of the American Ort federation, Mr. Tart has spoken to communities throughout the country on the special problems that today face refugees and war victims. To equip such people with skills to make them self-supporting, Ort-Organization for Rehabilitation Through Training—conducts trade schools, workshops and farming projects in Europe, Canada and South America.

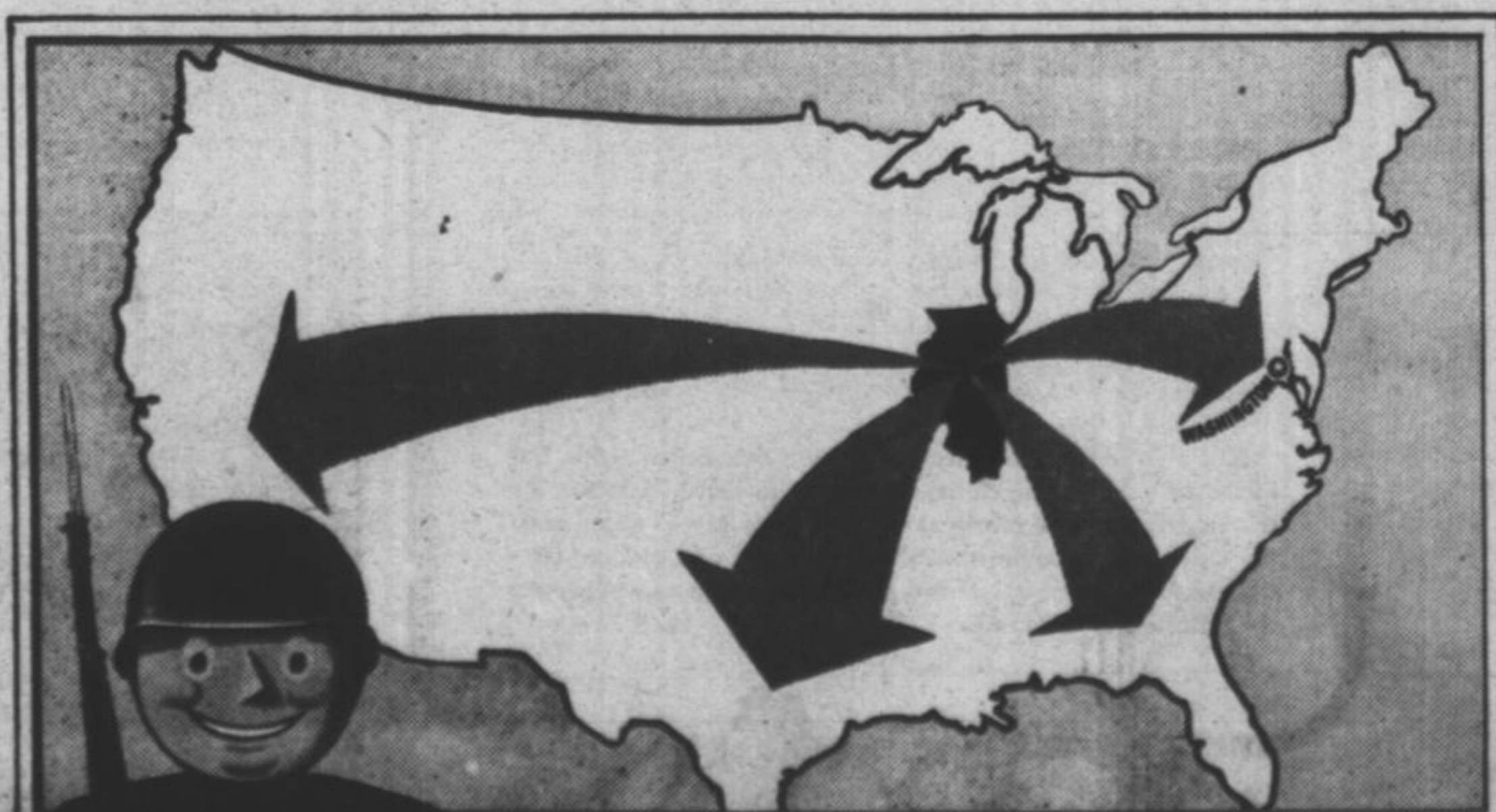
