Blood Plasma Vital To War Effort

The lives of Navy men who are battling our enemies on the seven seas are being saved every day by civilians thousands of miles away who are giving their blood at American Red Cross centers, according to a statement of thanks to the donors issued by Rear Admiral John Downes, U. S. N., Commanding Officer of the Ninth Naval

Citing the case of Bill Sullivan, seaman second class on the carrier Lexington in the battle of the Coral Sea. Admiral Downes said that this sailor was critically wounded when a Jap bomb hit near his gum crew station. With a crushed arm, a smashed foot, and shrapnel lodged in his back, head and legs, he managed to keep afloat

By all the rules, Seaman Sullivan should have been dead, according to Admiral Downes. His pulse and blood pressure could scarcely be detected. But Navy doctors pumped pint after pint of the life-saving plasma contributed by a dozen donors here into his veins, and signs of life returned.

"Today, Seaman Sullivan is alive, thanks to the patriotic Americans who have kept up this flow of life's fluid so that fighting men may live," Admiral Downes said. "The need great, and I am confident that our civlian population will need the call," he concluded.
