Shrine Circus Running for 10 Days At Medinah Temple

It takes a lot of things to make a circus—a lot of animals and trainers, clowns and tight-rope walkers, monkeys and horses, acrobats and ponies, bears and tumblers, dogs and elephants, and all those things, plus the approved trimmings, peanuts and popcorn, are offered this week at the Medinah Temple auditorium, Ohio and Wabash.

The Annual Shrine Circus produced by the Polack Bros. of circus fame opened its ten-day engagement last Friday and the capacity audience that witnessed the initial performance—grown ups and kiddies—was thrilled to no end.

Just how they managed to get all that stuff indoors and on a stage remains a mystery to most of the circus lovers; how they can set up and dismantle cages and nets for the different acts and do it with military precision is something that amazes the adult onlookers, who get double thrills—seeing the high grade acts and watching the prop men go through their dizzy paces.

The act that is daily receiving thunderous applause is the Gretonas who defy the laws of gravity with their sensational high-wire act riding two bicycles across a steel cable while the other members of the troupe form a pyramid three high while balancing long steel poles and tottering chairs.

The big dare-devil stunt of the new fast-moving one-ring circus is the Great Gregoresko who makes his sensational drop from the top of the auditorium to the ring edge performing his famous "hangman's noose" in which he breaks his fall by a rope around his neck and lives to tell about it.

Elephants which always thrill any circus audience entertain when Will Hill's performing giants go through their intricate routine on pedestals and tight-wire. Mona and Mary-Ann the twin elephants presented by the Polack Bros. also bring many o's and ah's as they stage their individual act later in the program.

Don Carlos Corraan with his famous Black Horse Troupe from Mexico City gets his due share of applause when he sends his charges through their routine in the ring guided by the famous blind lead horse "General Grant."

No program would be complete without the traditional seals and bears which perform under the direction of Captain Harry Pickard, well known owner of the famous seal farm at Red Bank, New Jersey. The high light of the Pallenberg bears is when "Joeko" the huge Russian bear pilots a full size motorcycle around and around at break neck speed.

The usual number of clowns, jugglers and pretty girls on the flying trapeze all help to make the action packed two and one half hour Shrine Circus one of the most enjoyable to be seen here in many years.

The Circus will bring its record-breaking run to a close with a night performance starting at 8:15, Sunday evening, February 7. There will be two performances daily with matinee starting at 3:15 except on Saturday and Sunday when the afternoon show gets under way at 2:15. Tickets are now on sale at the Adam Hat Store, Dearborn and Madison and at the Medinah Temple.

"Love" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, January 31.

The Golden Text was, "Keep yourselves in the love of God, looking for the mercy of our Lord, Jesus Christ unto eternal life" (Jude 1: 21).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Beloved, let us love one another: for love is of God; and everyone that loveth is born of God, and knoweth God. And we have known and believed the love that God hath to us. God is love; and he that dwelleth in love dwelleth in God, and God in him" (1 John 4: 7, 16).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "The everlasting I AM is not bounded nor compressed within the narrow limits of physical humanity, nor can He be understood aright through mortal concepts. The precise form of God must be of small importance in comparison with the sublime question: What is infinite Mind or divine Love? No form nor physical combination is adequate to represent infinite Love" (p. 256).
