Cow of Deerfield Man Establishes Record For Butterfat

R. V. Rasmussen of Deerfield is the owner of a registered Holstein cow which has just completed a record of 764 pounds of butterfat and 21,989 pounds of milk. This is four times the production of the average dairy cow in the country, according to the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

Her official name is Plus Bessie Sunflower. She was five years five months of age at the time she began her record. She was milked three times daily and tating was done under the supervision of the University of Illinois and the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

According to Mrs. Thomle, coffee ration ticket No. 5 is good from Feb. 8 until Mar. 14; the sugar card No. 11 may be used from now until Mar. 15; fuel oil ticket No. 3 ends Feb. 20, and No. 4 may be used until April 12.

The deadline for tire inspection for B and C gas ration cards and commercial vehicles is set for Feb. 28.

WINTER WITCHERY

A quick way to make Applesauce Rolls is to spread a rectangle of biscuit dough with sweetened applesauce. Roll it up jelly-roll fashion and slice in 1-inch slices. Place cut side down in greased muffin pans and bake in a moderately hot oven (425 degrees F.) about 20 minutes. For those who dote on the flavor of cheese add 1/4 cup of grated American cheese to the dry ingredients when mixing the biscuit dough.

Pep up your favorite muffin recipe by adding 1/2 cup of roasted jumbo peanuts to the batter. Plump a fat peanut on top of each muffin before putting them into the oven for extra table glamour.

A cup of chopped apples added to your griddlecake batter will bring the family on the run these chilly mornings? Apple griddlecakes are good for dessert, too. Serve with wedges of cheese if you would pick up every bit of that apple flavor.

Menus that include cranberries sparkle. Spread three tablespoons melted butter and 1/2 cup sugar on the bottom of an 8-inch pan. Top this with a layer of whole raw cranberries. Pour a quick coffee cake batter over the cranberries and bake in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.) for 25 minutes. Invert and serve scarlet side up.

Good nutrition and good food go hand in hand when gingerbread is the dinner or supper dessert. Both the molasses and enriched flour used to make the gingerbread are good sources of iron.

Lunches that pack vitality are lunches that include sandwiches made from enriched bread. The B-vitamins and iron added to enriched bread helps to keep the production army working at its 100 per cent best.

Let's get acquainted with the UNRATED MEATS

This hot savory pie features an unrationed meat—sweetbreads—as its chief ingredient.

WHOOPE! my dear! we're rationed on our old standbys—beef, lamb, pork, veal and mutton. It's generous—2 1/2 pounds per person a week. Even so, it's a good time to eat more fish and poultry—and particularly to become better acquainted with the unrationed meats—liver, tongue, kidneys, sweetbreads, tripe and so on.

These variety meats are every bit as nutritious as the larger cuts. In fact, some of them are richer in vitamin B. And as for flavor—well, we've been missing something all these years.

Perhaps we haven't used them as much as we might because we were unfamiliar with ways of cooking them. There's nothing difficult about that. For instance, don't we all enjoy hot meat pies. Well, here's the recipe for one made of sweetbreads and mushrooms with an extra flavor note of chicken. The chicken flavor comes from using that new and improved condensed chicken noodle soup for the gravy. Then we top it all with a featherlight biscuit crust—and my! it's good!

Sweetbreads and Mushroom Pie
To prepare sweetbreads and mushrooms—
1 pound sweetbreads
1/2 pound fresh mushrooms
2 tablespoons butter

Put sweetbreads in ice water for 20 minutes. Drain, plunge into 2 quarts of boiling water to which 2 tablespoons vinegar and 2 teaspoons salt have been added. Cover and simmer for 30 minutes. Lift out sweetbreads and plunge into ice water again. Drain, separate sweetbreads and carefully remove fat and thick connective tissues. Break into pieces. Slice the mushrooms and cook in 2 tablespoons melted butter until tender.

4 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
2 cans new and improved condensed chicken noodle soup
2 cups milk
1/2 cup light cream
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
Biscuit crust for top

Melt the butter, then add flour. Strain the soup just as it comes from the can. To the butter and flour add liquid from the soup, milk and cream and cook until thickened. Then add noodles and chicken (strained from soup), sweetbreads, mushrooms and seasonings. Put all into meat pie dish or casserole, cover with biscuit crust and bake in a hot oven (425°F) for 15 to 20 minutes. Serves 6.

Liver is another of the variety meats. Most people just fry liver and let it go at that. But you try it this way sometime:

Liver Sauté with Tomato Bacon Sauce

4 tablespoons bacon fat
2 tablespoons flour
1 1/2 pounds liver
1/2 cup chopped onion
1 can new and improved condensed tomato soup

1 can water
1 1/2 tablespoons brown sugar
2 tablespoons vinegar
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
Sprinkling of ground cloves
1/2 teaspoon salt
Pinch of pepper
2 slices crisp bacon, chopped

Dredge the liver in flour, then brown in the hot bacon fat. Add chopped onion and cook until soft and yellow. Combine tomato soup, water, brown sugar, vinegar, spices and seasonings, heat to boiling and pour over the cooked liver in the skillet. Simmer slowly for 1/2 hour, then remove meat to hot platter. Add chopped bacon to sauce and cook until about the consistency of medium cream sauce. Serve the sauce over the liver. Serves 6 to 8.

Job Insurance Pay Depends Upon 1941 Wages Until April

An unemployed worker's eligibility for job insurance benefits during the first three months of 1943 will continue to depend on his 1941 insured wages, State Director of Labor Francis B. Murphy has pointed out.

"Unemployment compensation benefits will be paid to workers who are or become unemployed between now and April 1, and who meet the other tests of eligibility, on the basis of insured wages they received during the year 1941 only," Director Murphy said. "Under the terms of the Illinois Unemployment Compensation Act benefits cannot be paid on 1942 wages until after April 1, 1943.

"Persons who worked in 1942 but not in 1941 cannot qualify for unemployment insurance benefits until April 1, 1943. The same is true for those workers who have already collected all the benefits to which they are entitled on their 1941 earnings.

Special Terms
"There is one exception to this rule," the Director added. "Men and women who are released from military service in the armed forces of the United States may qualify for benefits as soon as they are released if they cannot find employment. Such persons must, however, have entered the service on or after April 1, 1940, have served at least 90 consecutive days, and have earned a total of at least \$225 in insured employment during the quarter in which they were inducted and the four quarters immediately preceding that quarter."
In addition to having the required base period earnings, every worker must be able to work, willing to work and available for work in order to be eligible for benefits. Also, he must be registered for employment at his local office of the United States Employment service.
