Job Insurance Pay Depends Upon 1941 Wages Until April

An unemployed worker's eligibility for job insurance benefits during the first three months of 1943 will continue to depend on his 1941 insured wages, State Director of Labor Francis B. Murphy has pointed out.

"Unemployment compensation bene-City Clerk V. C. Musser was in- fits will be paid to workers who are or become unemployed between now and April 1, and who meet the other tests of eligibility, on the basis of inyear 1941 only," Director Murphy said. "Under the terms of the Illinois Unemployment Compensation Act benefits cannot be paid on 1942 wages until after April 1, 1943.

"Persons who worked in 1942 but Bills and payrolls for the month of not in 1941 cannot qualify for unem-April 1, 1943. The same is true for those workers who have already collected all the benefits to which they are entitled on their 1941 earnings.

Special Terms

"There is one exception to this rule," the Director added. "Men and women who are released from military service in the armed forces of the United States may qualify for benefits as soon as they are released if they cannot find employment.
