Presbyterian Women To Hear Y. W. C. A. Secretary Feb. 15

The Woman's Association of the Highland Park Presbyterian Church will have its regular monthly luncheon meeting and program Monday, Feb. 15 at the church.

The speaker for the program will be Miss Laura B. Cross, general secretary of the Highland Park Y.W.C.A. Her subject will be "The Part Christian Women will play in New China." Miss Cross was born in Minnesota and is a graduate of Carleton College and did graduate work at the University of Minnesota. She spent many years teaching at Bridgman Academy one of the oldest and largest high school for Chinese girls in Peking, China.

Living for three years in the Orient after the war started, she knows first hand the tragedies of occupied lands and saw the part Christian Organizations among which is the Y.W.C.A., are playing to help build a new China. Miss Cross has been lecturing in the United States since her return in 1940, and has for the past year been the general secretary of the Highland Park Y.W.C.A.

League School to Study World Between 1919 and 1939

Political, economic and social angles of the world between 1919 and 1939 will be outlined at the Highland Park League of Women Voters' school on Monday, Feb. 15, 1:15 at the Community center. The meeting is second in a series on the post war world, background study for discussions on our future peace settlement, sponsored by Mrs. Richard J. Loewenthal, chairman of the department of government and foreign policy, who says, "Waiting to win the war and then discuss the peace is too late. That was done in 1919; and it failed. Peace principles must be thought out now."

Mrs. Carroll Binder will talk on social changes in Europe — 1919 to 1939; Mrs. D. L. Clinton on the League of Nations, international labor organizations, and the World Court; and Mrs. Myron S. Gutmann on economic developments between 1919 and 1939.

Lists of the ten Americans each member would like to see at the Peace Conference, will be brought to the meeting, at the suggestion of Mrs. Walter Rubens, chairman of the League school. All interested Highland Parkers are invited to attend.
