Dan Davis Successfully Coaching Coast Guard Team

Word comes via clippings from the sports page of the San Francisco Call-Bulletin, that "Danny" Davis former Highland Park high school athlete and son of Mr. and Mrs. D. H. Davis of Linden Ave., is coaching basketball for the Coast Guard.

After earning his basketball letter at Highland Park high school before graduating in 1937, Dan spent one year at Northwestern Military Academy, where although he was the shortest man on the team, he scored the highest number of points in basketball. The following two years were spent at Baylor University, Waco, Texas. And some time was spent traveling. His travels took him around the country and to Hawaii. The marriage of his sister, Pauline, brought him home before the attack on Pearl Harbor.

In May, 1942, he and John Brigham, formerly of Ridgewood drive, volunteered for the United States Coast Guard. More fortunate than most buddies, who join up together, Davis and Brigham have managed to stay together during the different phases of training which included a New Orleans station, schooling by the Marines in San Diego and finally San Francisco.

Davis, who is a seaman first class, met a petty officer from Oak Park. Both had played basketball in the high school suburban league conference, and at his suggestion he umpired a game for the Coast Guard. He was then put on as coach of the Surf Riders.

Out on San Francisco, Coach Davis is getting a lot of favorable comments by sports editors for his fine coaching of the Surf Riders who come from the Captain of the Port Battalion. Ed Romero of the Call-Bulletin in one write-up said:

"Produce and you'll be recognized. This town is strictly 'big league.' Your work is cut out for you."

"Perhaps it was consequence or unerring foresight, but Coach Dan Davis is of the Coast Guard Surf Riders, who are presently leading all bay area basketball teams in games won knew whereof he spoke when he called his hoopmen together back in December an issued the aforementioned advice.

Since that brief locker room chat, Davis and his powerful quintet have climbed the ladder of success, step by step, determinedly and impressively."

Coach Davis says the height of his sports career will be reached the night he coaches his quintet against Stanford University.

The basketball team of the Women's Auxiliary Corps of Fort Sheridan played their first basketball game—probably the first WAAC game in the middle-west—at Waukegan on February 10. Their opponents were St. Anne's KSKJ girls of North Chicago. Men's rules were used.

Frand Mordini, Highland Park high school graduate of 1941, volunteered for duty with the Merchant Marine and was sworn into service on January 29. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Enrico Mordini of 242 Everts Place, Highland, he will report for training duty in the near future.

A series of rugged proficiency tests to ascertain whether units have reached the degree of physical excellence demanded by modern warfare is being administered by the anti-aircraft artillery training center at Fort Sheridan.

The tests consist of six fatiguing events, and each man is graded on the proficiency of performance. It is believed that all men should be able to score perfectly after completing the preliminary training.

The initial event calls for 33 push-ups done in succession. After that, the men must run 300 yards at top speed. They are expected to do that distance in 45 seconds.

Burpees are next. (A burpee is an exercise done in the following manner: legs extended to the rear, with the weight on hands and toes; return to the squat position and back to attention at the count of four.) The men are given 20 seconds to do eleven.

After that, each of the men must pack a fellow soldier's back for

a 75-yard run. Men are given 20 seconds for that feat. The exercise is followed by a 70-yard zig-zag, agility run to be covered in 30 seconds.

The men complete the test with a four-mile hike that must be done in 50 minutes.

This test will be administered to all units of the AATC after they have had sufficient training. One battalion already has taken the test.

The nephew of the country's ranking U. S. Naval Reserve officer is starting on the same way his uncle did—as a seaman. The new recruit at Great Lakes Naval Training Station is John W. The new bluejacket not only has Rear Admiral Evers' record to serve as an example, but also the records of three other uncles who were commissioned officers in the navy during World War I. His father was a warrant officer.

Rear Admiral Evers enlisted as a seaman during the Spanish-American war and was commanding officer at Navy Pier in 1917. He was sworn in as a rear admiral by Rear Admiral John Downes, commandant of the Ninth Naval District, at Great Lakes, and is the only reserve admiral in the navy.

Sunday Evening Club Closes With Talk By Dr. Hambro

The North Shore Sunday Evening club will close its 29th year on Sunday evening, Feb. 14, at New Trier high school with a lecture by C. J. Hambro, president of the League of Nations Assembly and president of the Norwegian Parliament.

His subject will be "Making Peace Succeed." Dr. Hambro knew Europe before the Nazi menace; he knew the League of Nations in all its weaknesses and possibilities. He witnessed the downfall of his native Norway, escaped to Sweden with his King and Queen, and remained to rally the forces of a Free Norway. Now, in this country, he continues to work not only for a Free Norway, but for a free and united world, under a modern and more workable League of Nations.

He is well known in the United States for his book, "I Saw It Happen In Norway," and for his successful nationwide lecture tour of last season. His talks are enjoyed for their "native American speech."
