Cmdr. Paul Date to Head Coast Guard Temporary Reserve

As part of an important new plan designed to release alble young Coast Guard officers and trained men for combat duty at seat, the United States Coast Guard has developed a new plan for civilian participation in th war effort, enrolling men as temporary members of the Coast Guard Re-

Temporary membership in this Reduty ashore and afloat, designed not armed forces since February 2. to disrupt business or family ties.

Those who take part in this new plan will wear the official Coast Guard Temporary Reserve uniform with uniform marking of their rank or rate when on active duty. However, they will not be exempt from selective service nor will the yereceive special consideration from draft boards.

According to Captain Thomas A. Shanley, District Coast Guard Officer, the intention of the plan is to turn over the manning of certain patrol stations, and even duty on lake steamers, to competent reservists not eli gible for regular service by reason of age, dependencies or minor physical disabilities. By serving one day a week or more each, younger men will be relieved for more arduous duty in the Coast Guard's rapidly expanding fleet of sub-chasers and landing boats or manning troop transports.
