Brig. Gen. Longino Commanding General At Sheridan AAATC

Brig. Gen. Olin H. Longino, who already has experienced overseas duty in the present war, is the new commanding general of the Antiaircraft Artillery Training center at Fort Sheridan.

He relieved Brig. Gen. LaRhett L. Stuart, who has been transferred to another station after commanding the AAATC since March, 1942.

Gen. Longino brings to Fort Sheridan experience gained in an army career that spans 34 years. He was commissioned as a second lieutenant in 1908 after graduation from the Georgia School of Technology the previous year. In 1910 he was promoted to first lieutenant, in 1916 to captain, in 1920 to major, in 1932 to lieutenant colonel, in 1937 to colonel, and to brigadier general in January, 1941.

He is a graduate of the Coast Artillery school, the advanced Coast Artillery school, the General Command Staff school and the Army War college.

Gen. Longino was at Camp Edwards, Mass., when the Japs attacked Pearl Harbor. He became regional commander of the antiaircraft defenses in New England and later went to Ireland where he was stationed until late in December, 1942. After a short tour of duty at Camp Davis, N. C., he arrived here.

Deerfield Man Flies Fortress Over France

In the raid on Brest last week when American fliers bombed the German naval base in France, Lieut. Craig Harwood of Deerfield, was among those taking part in the raid.

Husband of the former Jane Todd of Deerfield, Lieut. Harwood flew his plane the "Tally-Ho" safely back to its base despite the punctured wings and fuselage from the enemy anti-aircraft fire. The "Tally-Ho" was in the leading formation.

Lieut. Harwood has been in England since last spring and was recently advanced to the rank of first lieutenant and command pilot.

Before his marriage, Lieut. Harwood resided in Ravinia with his sister, Mrs. W. M. Rogers of Button avenue.

"Why I look only half my age"



Pardon me for bragging, but I do look as young and can do as good work as a brand new electric iron.

Of course, all the credit goes to my owner for giving me special wartime care.

She knows that the materials ordinarily used to make electric irons are now needed for war production; so she's making sure that I keep in good condition for the duration:

I think it's a swell idea, and suggest that you give your electric iron this care, too.

Each time, after using the iron and it has cooled off, wipe the sole plate with a damp cloth. If necessary, use soap suds or mild scouring powder, but don't immerse the iron in water.

Every month, rub the sole plate with paraffin or beeswax.

If your iron has a detachable cord, always plug the cord into the iron before plugging it into the wall outlet.

When you've finished ironing, remove the plug from the outlet first, then from the iron. Never pull on the cord.

And remember, don't let the cord touch the hot iron or rub on the edge of the ironing board. Either may wear off the insulation.

Most cases of damaged irons are caused by dropping them.

So make sure your ironing table is steady. Always rest the iron on the heel rest, the stand or the insulating pad.

Another way to save wear and tear on your iron is to avoid running over buttons, hooks and other hard objects which may injure the sole plate.

Well, there you are. It's as simple as that to give your electric iron the proper care... and it means so much to the life of the iron.

Speaking from experience, I know that these suggestions will help to keep your iron from growing old... yes, and help to keep it working for the duration.

So take a tip from me. Start now to give your iron this wartime care.

What if something does go wrong?

If your iron shows signs of overheating, have it inspected by a service man right away.

If the iron fails to operate, before deciding that it is out of order, make sure the plug is in, the appliance switch is on, and the outlet is "alive".

This little check-up may save you money and spare you some anxious moments.
