Each time, after using the iron and it has cooled off, wipe the sole plate with a damp cloth. If necessary, use soap suds or mild scouring powder, but don't immerse the iron in water.


Every month, rub the sole plate with paraffin or beeswax.



Meet cases of damaged irons are caused

by dropping them. So make sure your ironing table is steady. Always rest the iron on the heel rest, the stand or the insulating pad.

Another way to save wear and tear on your iron is to avoid running over buttons, books and other hard objects which may injure the sole plate.
