
> At this particular time there are a great many boys from the east as well as the south, and they all are of the opinion that the girls out here in the middle west are far more attractive than the girls back home.

With the present increased display of the national emblem, one becomes conscious of the ignorance concerning the correct usage of the American Flag. How many of us know the occasion on which it should be displayed; the manner of raising and lowering; saluting the flag; special rules governing display of flag and many other points.

Aside from the proper display of the flag, the origin and history not only of the Stars and Stripes, but other American flags is an absorbing study.

The American Flag, with a few exceptions, is the oldest national standard in the world. That of Denmark adopted in 1219 is the oldest European national standard. The alternate red and white stripes, thirteen in number, represent the original thirteen states. Stars are added to the blue field as new states are admitted to the union. Hence the flag symbolizes the origin of the Republic and its growth into a union of 48 states,
