Heifetz to Appear With Chgo. Symphony On March 18-19

Jascha Heifetz, one of the truly great violinists of today, will be the soloist with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra at the Thursday and Friday concerts (March 18 and 19) under the baton of Hans Lange.

Heifetz, whose December engagement with the Symphony was cancelled because of his illness, has now so completely recuperated that he will play the very demanding Elgar Concerto for Violin, B Minor, Opus 61, which has been played only a few times in Chicago.

The Symphony's program for the week opens with the Milwaukee concert on Monday night (March 15) when the Symphony will play the Shostakovich Symphony No. 1. A popular concert is scheduled for Saturday night at 8:15, with Lange on the podium.

Heifetz is fulfilling one of the heartiest concert schedules of his career this season. The noted Russian's tour has been enlarged to include many concerts for service men in camps, between his engagements.

A native of Vilna, Russia, Heifetz began his musical lessons at the age of three and at 16 was touring the world with his family. Since then he has circled the globe four times and has played in virtually all countries in the world, until today he ranks with the finest violinists of the generation.

Great "Ice-Capades" Revue At Chicago Arena March 14

110 Stars, 28 Acts On Brilliant Program; Limited Run

Boasting of a star-studded cavalcade of gay blades, the greatest number of individual performers as well as the largest cast of any musical "Ice-Invaganna," "Ice-Capades of 1943" inaugurates the new spectacle season at Chicago Arena with a limited engagement starting Sunday night, March 14.

The Chicago run is necessarily limited, with the closing date to be set later, because negotiations now are underway for the "Ice-Capades" cast to make a third movie in Hollywood.

Matinees Carded

Sunday afternoon matinees, except for opening day, are scheduled at the Chicago Arena. Seats are now on sale at the Arena or Hub in downtown Chicago. Special attention is being paid to mail orders at the Arena, 400 E. Erie St., in Chicago.

Two previous editions of the same show toured the nation and Canada with record-breaking results, according to its owners, the Arena Managers' Association. During the season ending in May, the company is said to have played to well over two million customers. They also have made two motion pictures in Hollywood, the latest of which will be released in the early Fall.

The company consists of 110 young and experienced skaters, 28 all-star acts, 50 "Ice-Ca" "pets," or ladies of the ensemble, and 24 Ice-Cadets. Chester Hale of Hollywood and Broadway production fame, lead and directed it.

\$150,000 Show

"Ice-Capades of 1943" is hailed as a three-in-one show of dazzling display. As it unfolds in all its present beauty, it is first and last an exhibition of skating that frequently defies the laws of gravity. It is secondly a gorgeously costumed \$150,000 production, which will utilize every inch of the arena ice surface, inside with a beautiful colored design. With the present increased display of the national emblem, one becomes conscious of the ignorance concerning the correct usage of the American Flag. How many of us know the occasion on which it should be displayed; the manner of raising and lowering; saluting the flag; special rules governing display of flag and many other points.

Aside from the proper display of the flag, the origin and history not only of the Stars and Stripes, but other American flags is an absorbing study.

The American Flag, with a few exceptions, is the oldest national standard in the world. That of Denmark adopted in 1219 is the oldest European national standard. The alternate red and white stripes, thirteen in number, represent the original thirteen states. Stars are added to the blue field as new states are admitted to the union. Hence the flag symbolizes the origin of the Republic and its growth into a union of 48 states.
