

You may think this eaption stretches the truth a bit, but it doesn't, really. Did you know that the Army A series of five training courses for Air Corps, when a candidate fails to pass the sight requirements for enlistment by only a slight margin. often suggests a steady diet of carrots to bring the sight up to necessary standards? Well, it's true, because I know a boy personally who had that experience.

> Do you know that four states furnish the bulk of the carrots that are marketed in the United States-New York, California, Texas and Arizona. All of them are far from the center of the country, and if every home gardener would grow enough carrots for his own use, it would relieve the transportation congestion in a small

> One of the main essentials in growing good carrots is a soil that has been deeply preparted so the roots can penetrate and develop without hindrance; also there must be an ample supply of food in the soil so that growth will be steady and rapid. When preparing the seedbed, use one pound of complete plant food for each twenty-five feet of row. When the soil is prepared, apply the plant food in a strip approximately six inches wide, then rake it into the top soil before planting the seed.

> Some leading varieties of carrots are: Stump-rooted varieties: Chantenay, Danvers Half-Long, and Nantes; New streamlined variety: Imperator (an All-America Selection).

Since carrots germinate slowly, is a good idea to sow radish seed in the row also, as a row marker. Space rows 12 to 18 inches apart.

Make succession sowings every two weeks up to early July. For winter use, make a sowing about the middle of June, which will make a good sized root before winter sets in.

BEST BUYS THIS WEEK

Homemakers will find carrots, turnips, spinach, lettuce and celery in more normal supply than most vegeare young and tender. Late crop tables at this time, Lance Hooks, Fegrown for storing of course must be deral Food Reporter for the Department of Agriculture said today. Carrots are mostly the bunched kinds coming from Texas, Arizona and California. In fact, we are depending upon these states and Florida for our rathen small supply of most fresh vegetables right now. Recent crop damage to many tender Florida vegetables and unfavorable growing conditions in Texas are partially responsible for the smaller supply this month. Green beans, for instance, have practically disappeared from the market. The small supply of tomatoes, green peas, and cabbage were put under price ceilings recently, along with many other fresh vegetables. Much of the cabbage which usually comes to Chicago is being shipped to eastern cities where prices are higher.


Thrifty homemakers can save some of the high points rationed canned fruits would require by taking advantage of the large supply of apples on the market. Many mid-western varieties of apples are available, including Baldwins, Starks, Greenings and Spys. Most all citrus fruit is selling at ceiling prices, southern juice oranges, some small size grapefruit and the dwindling supplies of tangerines are among those citrus fruits with the lowest price ceilings.
