### LLOYD MAGNUSEN REPORTED MISSING

Pfc. Lloyd Magnusen has been reported by the War Department as missing in action in the North African theatre of war since February 15. His father, Arvid Magnusen of 2335 South Green Bay road has been notified.

Employed locally after his graduation from Highland Park high school, Magnusen reported for service in November 1941. He has served in Eng-

land, being sent overseas in the early part of last summer. In November he was transferred to North Africa where he served as a chief gunner on a tank.

His father, who was employed by the Highland Park post office for thirty-seven years, has another son, Sgt. Edwin Magnusen in service. Sgt. Magnusen was inducted two months before his brother, and is an instructor in air theory at the army air base in Sioux Falls, S. D.

Capt. Wayne King has been advanced to the rank of major and is now stationed in Washington. Major King formerly resided on Lincolnwood drive and was serving in Chicago prior to his promotion and transfer.

Home on his first furlough since entering service eight months ago is Pvt. Richard Hocking who is visiting his wife Edith, and mother, Mrs. Anna Hocking of Prairie avenue, Highwood. He is serving with the army air forces' military police at Salt Lake City, Utah.

Naval Aviation Cadet Lyman Edwin Benson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Astor Benson of 630 S. St. Johns avenue, has been transferred to the Naval Air Training Center, Corpus Christi, Texas, after successful completion of the primary flight training course at the Naval Air Station at Glenview, Ill.

After passing the advanced flight training course at Corpus Christi, Cadet Benson will pin on his wings as a Naval Aviator and be commissioned as an Ensign in the Naval Reserve or a Second Lieutenant in the Marine Corps Reserve.

Benson is a graduate of Highland Park high school and received his B. A. B. degree from Georgetown University, Georgetown, Ky. While in college he won varsity letters as a member of the football, basketball and track teams.

Cadet Benson began his Naval Aviation career at the Navy's Pre-Flight School at the University of Iowa, Iowa City, Iowa.

The silver bars of first lieutenant have been awarded to Hugh B. Suttle, an instructor-pilot at the new Coffeyville Army Air Field, Coffeyville, Kansas.

Lieutenant Suttle, whose home is at 807 Lincoln Ave., attended Carleton college, Northfield, Minn., and was a member of the college baseball team. He was commissioned a second lieutenant on July 3, 1942, and came from the Enid, Okla., Army Flying School, where he was a flying instructor.
