Seeing Eye Opens Membership Enrollment April 13

Mrs. Baldwin Newman of 359 Hazel avenue, Highland Park, Vice Chairman of The Seeing Eye Chicago Enrollment committee, held a meeting of her team members at her home on Monday, March 22nd, in preparation for The Seeing Eye enrollment which will take place from April 13th to May 11th. Mrs. Irene Sidley, Chairman of the enrollment, was the speaker.

Mrs. Sidley explained that the object of the enrollment is to secure 1,000 new members for the philanthropic organization which trains dogs as guides for blind people. In telling of the part of The Seeing Eye in the war effort, she read the Resolution passed by its Board of Trustees on December 8, 1941, which states that the school has formally pledged itself to endeavor to supply dogs, without cost to the Federal Government, to eligible members of our armed forces who lose their sight in line of duty; also to give these men priority over all other applicants.

Mrs. Sidley also cited numerous instances of blind graduates of the Seeing Eye working in war industries, or filling other jobs which release sighted men for service in the armed forces. Fully 85 per cent of Seeing Eye graduates, she stated are employed in full time jobs, are attending school or are housewives.

In explaining to the assembled guests their role in the coming Seeing Eye Membership Enrollment, Mrs. Sidley stated that the school is dependent on the contributions of its members for support.

Final Lecture of Helen Adams Series April 7

Woman's Club Looks Backward to World War I Activities

April 1902—The first rummage sale ever held in Highland Park was engineered by the Woman's club. Net receipts \$174.04.

October 1, 1902—One of five traveling libraries was sent to Gray's Lake. When there was no further call for the libraries, the books and monies were given to the Highwood school.

April 2, 1901—Speaker's topic, "Has Club Life Become a Dissipation to Women."

October 25, 1902—First Reciprocity day—Twenty clubs represented.

October 1, 1901—Members were requested to remove hats and given permission to bring fancy work to meetings.

November 28, 1899—Lecture by Reverend Pfantstiehl. The club was indebted to Siegel and Cooper of Chicago for the loan of Queen Wilhelmina's portrait—the Holland Flag—and the Dutch wedding dress which had been in the possession of one family for 500 years.

Dec. 26, 1899—Topic: "What Can the Women of H. P. do for Their City?"

April 2, 1901—A committee was appointed to discuss ways and means of solving the city's garbage problem.

Feb. 16, 1909—Club equipped a tent for the Tuberculosis institute at Waukegan.

Nov. 9, 1909—After a meeting of the club's education department, a conference was held to organize the first Parent-Teacher's association here.

August 7, 1913—A motion was made and carried that the club co-operate with the Chicago Women's clubs, and refrain from buying eggs until the price came down to 32 cents per dozen.

Jan. 24, 1911—The Woman's club committee of three sold 29,484 tuberculosis stamps, the largest number sold in any North Shore town.

August 7, 1920—It was moved that a committee interview the City Council as to whether a street umbrella for the crossing policeman was acceptable.

March 30, 1920—The club joined the Chicago Club in expressing a desire to have the Grand Opera company give opera in English.

October 29, 1918—To date members had purchased \$41,150.00 in Liberty Bonds.

Chaplain Jonas To Preach At Presbyterian Church

Chaplain Otto K. Jonas, the post chaplain at Fort Sheridan, will preach at the Highland Park Presbyterian church on Sunday morning, Mar. 28. Chaplain Jonas, a native of Boston and a graduate of Andover Theological seminary, is a minister of the Congregational church. The service is at 11 o'clock.

Bethany Church to Hear Chicago Pastor At Vesper Services

The candidates meeting, being arranged by the Highland Park League of Women Voters, is aimed to qualify all voters for more intelligent participation in the forthcoming elections. At 8 o'clock on Tuesday, Mar. 30, at the Community center, leaguers and non-leaguers will be given the opportunity to see, hear, and question the candidates up for election in the three separate campaigns for city, township and park board jobs.

Invited to appear before this meeting are the men seeking election to the offices of mayor, city commissioners and police magistrate for the city; supervisor and assistant supervisor for the township, and commissioners for the park board. At the conclusion of their brief talks of three minutes each, the public may submit in writing questions which apply to the candidate's qualifications for office, plans for efficient conduct of affairs if elected, etc. The township and park board elections are held Tuesday, April 6, and the city election is two weeks later, on Tuesday, April 20.

Mrs. Louis Haller, president of the league, will preside at the candidate's meeting, arrangements for which are being made by Mrs. Van G. Kirk, chairman of the department of government and its operation. Mrs. David Levinson will briefly explain the proposed recreation tax which will appear on the municipal ballot.

Estimated Allied airplane production is at 9,500 per month against 4,000 per month for the Axis. Looks like U.S.A. will make 100,000 planes in 1943. Air Craft Production Personnel has been expanded 1,500,000. Present backlog of orders amounts to 9 billion dollars.

This year 99% of Great Lakes Ore Carriers are equipped with Ship to Shore radio equipment. Radio service boosts tonnage 10% to 30% through transmission of pickup and delivery orders en route. These ore boats haul most of the coal we use to make gas and coke. A boat is now loaded with our coal ready to make the trip from Ohio as soon as the ice is gone. We use nearly 200,000 tons of coal each year. In fact, coal is one of our major items of expense. And has it gone up in price?

Our new system of bi-monthly meter readings is working out very well. We read the even numbered routes one month and bill the remaining one half of our customers on an averaged or estimated basis. Then on the following month we read the odd numbered routes. Of course any slight difference between estimated and actual use corrects itself when we actually read the meter on the second month. This system allows one more man to go to war.
