## Hallett Abend, Author, Is Host To Local Boy

Hallett Abend, famous Far Eastern correspondent, lecturer and author of "Ramparts of the Pacific" and the "Pacific Charter," current best seller, recently stopped off in Chicago to invite William Aiston, Lake Forest student of Highland Park, to dinner and to attend a performance of "Dough Girls," of which he is co-author.

Young Aiston states that his friendship with Mr. Abend began following his lecture appearance at Lake Forest college, when both met on a south-bound train. In the interesting conversation which followed, he adds, he rode past his station and Mr. Abend invited him to ride on in to Chicago and be his guest for the night at the Drake hotel.

Mr. Abend was Far Eastern correspondent for the New York Times for fifteen years and is recognized as one of the leading authorities on the Orient. Just prior to Pearl Harbor, he was commissioned to travel 27,000 miles by plane over the Pacific battle area and upon his return he made a personal report to President Roosevelt. Bill Aiston states that he had the thrill of hearing first hand many of the incidents from one to whom General Douglas MacArthur and almost all of the other leading figures in the news is known personally.

### Football Star

William Aiston, or "Bill" as he is best known, will be remembered for his star performance with the Highland Park football team of two years ago, when he was named All-Star and received the highest vote on the All-Star team. He attended DePaul university and is at present attending Lake Forest college. He enlisted and was accepted some months ago as a naval aviation cadet and recently was awarded a second alternate appointment to Annapolis following the state-wide competitive examination. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Aiston, 918 Ridgewood drive.

Bill Aiston states that just before leaving to continue his lecture tour after which he will return to his country place in Vermont, Mr. Abend presented him with an autographed copy of his latest book in which he inscribed "This is your standing invitation to visit me in Vermont."

## Ice-Capades of 1943 Boasts Many Talented Stars

One of the most striking assets of "Ice-Capades of 1943," the brilliant \$150,000 ice revue which opened a limited engagement at the Chicago Arena, is the prolific amount of authentic figure skating talent included in the star-studded cast of 110.

The show boasts a number of champions, in addition to the array of diversified entertainers combining to make this one of the outstanding ice presentations of all time.

Youthful and titan-haired Donna Atwood won the national junior figure skating championship in 1941 and teamed up with Gene Turner to take the senior pairs crown as well.

Vera Hruba was five times champion of her own native Czechoslovakia before coming to America in 1937, recently becoming an American citizen.

Nate Walley, paired up in "Ice-Capades of 1943" with his beautiful wife, the former Edith Dustman who graduated from Northwestern University, won the world's figure skating championship in England in 1934. Henry Lie is the figure skating champion of his native Norway.

Robert Dench and Rosemarie Stewart are British gold medalists. He won the empire pro waltzing contest on ice in 1936, and together they captured numerous pair-skating titles in England. Phil Taylor, for 25 years, has been recognized as the world's stilt skating champion.

And there are those two charming baton-twirling queens, Betty Brown Lee, who took the American Legion national majorette honors before joining "Ice-Capades" and Patti Phillippi, who was the mid-western titleholder. Add to these such star acts as Leary & Flaig, Condon and Bohland, Joe Jackson Jr., Al Surette, Chuckie Stein, Ted Meza, Eldon and Denise, Kinder Sisters, Murry Twins, Markhus and Thomas, Brinckmann Sisters, the 50 lovely "Ice-Capets" and 25 "Ice-Cadets" and it readily can be seen why the production is winning rave notices everywhere it plays.
