## Chicago Symphony Orchestra Concludes Season's Program

One of the season's most varied programs has been planned by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra for its Thursday-Friday concerts, April 15-16, in Orchestra Hall under the baton of Hans Lange.

Soloist at the two concerts and final artist of the season will be Claudio Arrau, native of Chili and one of South America's greatest pianists, who will play the familiar Schumann Concerto for Pianoforte.

An additional feature will be the Chicago premiere of a martial suite by David Van Vactor, outstanding young middle Western composer and flutist with the Symphony. The composition, "Music of the Marines" was commissioned by the Marine Corps and had its premiere in Indianapolis March 27. At its Chicago premiere "his week the composer will conduct."

The Symphony is also to present for the first time "Concertante Symphony," a composition by Stamitz, eighteenth century composer who is regarded as one of the founders of the modern symphony. The program also contains a memorial to Sergei Rachmaninoff, who was soloist with the Symphony just a month before his recent death. The orchestra will play Rachmaninoff's composition Vocalise for Solo and Orchestra.

The week's schedule includes the final Tuesday program of the year. Hans Lange will conduct. Jane Anderson who regularly fulfills piano assignments with the orchestra, will be at the piano. Ernest Ligel, the Symphony's brilliant principal flutist, will play the flute obligato in the Bach Suite No. 2, B Minor, for Strings and Flute. The concluding concert of the week will be the aSturdy night Popular concert at which Lange will again conduct.
