## Woman's Club Features Early American Exhibit

John H. Bereman spoke before the collectors' study group of the Highland Park Woman's club Tuesday morning, at which time he exhibited his collection of Early American silver.

Included in the exhibit were a three-piece tea set of Adams design, made in New York about 1790 by John Burger, a sauce boat inscribed and dated 1789, a rare pear shaped covered sugar circa 1760, and a rare tall coffee pot by Joseph and Nathaniel Richardson of Philadelphia, made during the Revolutionary war for a member of the well known Morris family.

Rarely found is the small boat shaped dish known as a "pop boat" used for feeding invalids and children of the 18th century American families. This was made by Bery: Halsted of New York and is pre-Revolutionary. Also shown was a "cann," 18th century by Brasher of New York, whose shop was patronized by Washington while he was president.
