

It is simply that all red-blooded Americans balk at the idea of having their minds made up for them.

To lose an election is no disgrace. If it were, William Jennings Byran would have been in disrepute, instead of enjoying the respect that he did at all times.

There is still an opportunity to vote for the candidate of your choice. If you wish to write in another name on the ballot when you cast your vote, it is your privilege to do so. When you go to the polls on April the 20th, consider the matter carefully, make your OWN decision, and vote as you please.
