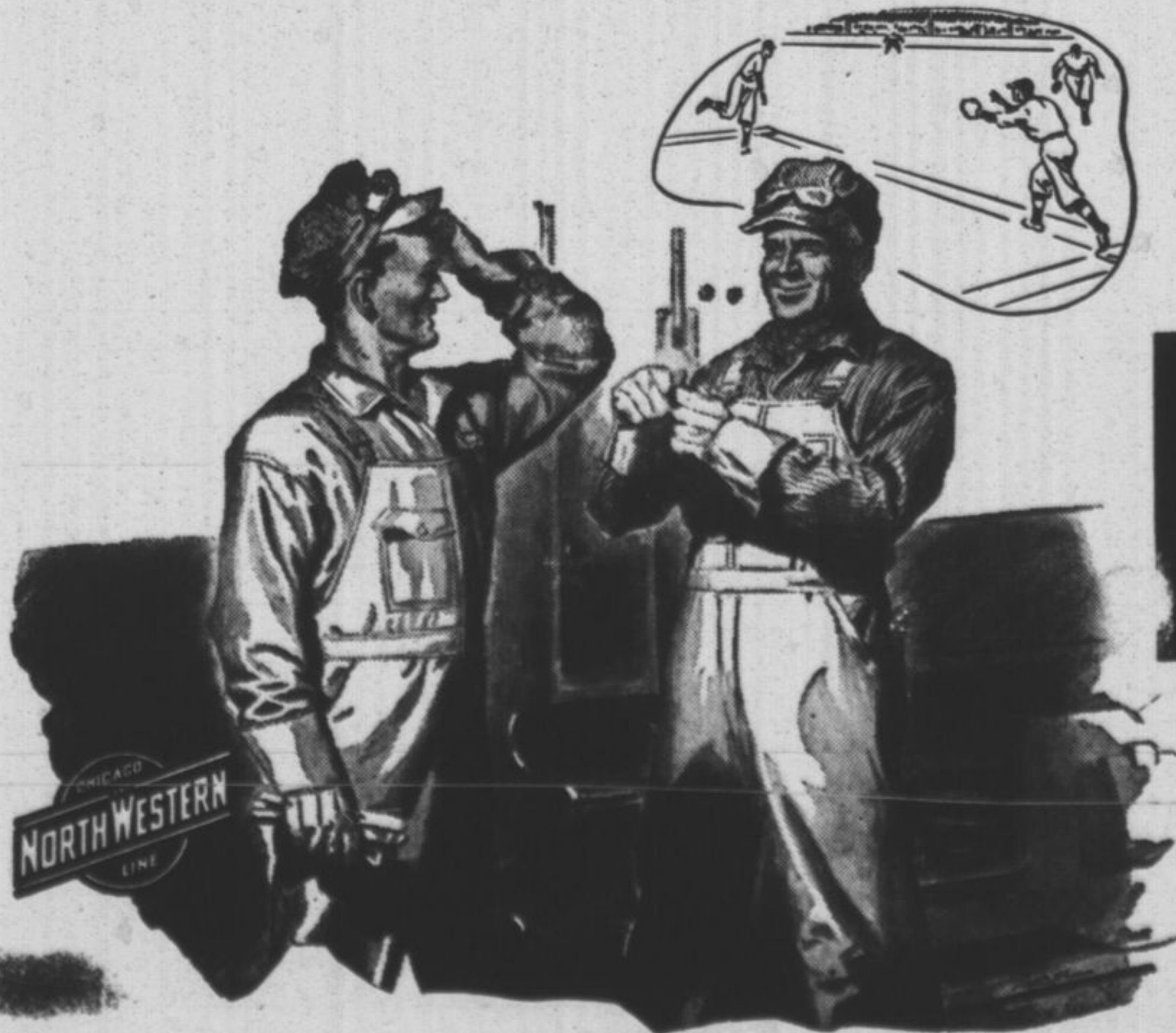
"CHALK US UP WITH Another Assist"

His graying hair indicated years of service, but as he climbed down from the engine cab he moved as quickly as a youngster. "Jim," he said to his fireman, "we've hauled many a load of valuable freight but none more important than this war material." Then with a wrinkle in his eye he added, "Back in our baseball days we were credited with many an 'assist.' Now they can chalk us up with a lot more . . . for Uncle Sam."
