Annual All-Day Meeting of Voters League April 21

The entire membership is invited to attend the 10 o'clock board meeting held in the solarium to hear of the problems and achievements of the past year as reflected in the reports presented by the various chairmen.

Gospel Song Writer, G. S. Schuler To Speak At Church

George S. Schuler, member of Moody Bible institute faculty and gospel song writer, will speak at 7:45 Wednesday, Thursday and Friday evenings, April 21-23, in the First United Evangelical church, according to the pastor, the Rev. F. S. Robinson.

Mr. Schuler is best known for the hymns and gospel songs he has written, including "Make Me a Blessing," "Overshadowed," and "Oh, What a Day." His "I'm a Pilgrim" was sung around the world by the evangelistic singer, Charles Alexander.

Except for a year's leave of absence, Mr. Schuler has been a member of the institute's music faculty since 1903. Besides teaching piano, pipe organ, and other musical subjects, Mr. Schuler has written several books, including "Evangelistic Piano Playing," "Choral Directing" and "Gospel Song and Hymn Tune Composition." He contributes regularly to The Etude, music journal, and has traveled considerably as a music director in Bible conferences and evangelistic campaigns.

Mr. Schuler is a graduate of the Chicago Musical college and the American Conservatory of Music, Chicago. For two periods he directed the Moody Memorial church choir, and one year served as superintendent of the Newark, N.J., Gospel Tabernacle.
