He described industrial and manpower conditions in England and various plans to combat inflation and unemployment, stressing the importance of maintaining reciprocal trade agreements. Mr. Clark complimented the league on its broadside entitled "Inflation," copies of which were distributed to everyone present. Questions from the floor followed his speech.
