A special celebration in honor of loving, unselfish mothers, planned in a Philadelphia Sunday school, was the beginning to *Mother's Day* in this country. The idea spread quickly, and Congress recommended to the president that a day be set apart as "*Mother's Day*."

Said Congress: "The service rendered the United States by the American mother is the greatest source of the country's strength and inspiration. We honor ourselves and the mothers of America when we do anything to give emphasis to the home as the fountainhead of the state, and the American mother, the moral uplift, and religion, can mother is doing so much for the hence so much good for government and for humanity."

On May 8, 1914, President Wilson issued a proclamation directing government officials to fly the Stars and Stripes on all government buildings, and also asking the people to display the flag at their homes and other suitable places, on the second Sunday of May, "as a public expression of our love and reverence for the mothers of our country."

One of the features in the celebration of the Mother's Day is the wearing of a white carnation. This lovely custom first began in memory of President McKinley, who always wore his favorite flower in honor of his mother, but it is truly the badge for a Mother's Day, pure white, and fragrant as a mother's love.

"Everlasting Punishment" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, May 2.

The Golden Text was: "Whosoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap" (Galatians 6: 7).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Many sorrows shall be to the wicked; but he that trusteth in the Lord, mercy shall compass him about. I have seen the wicked in great power, and spreading himself like a green bay tree. Yet he be passed away, and lo, he was not: yea, I sought him, but he could not be found" (Psalms 32: 10; Ps. 37; 35, 36).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Sinners flourish 'like a green bay tree'; but, looking farther, the Psalmist could see their end,—the destruction of sin through suffering. . . . We cannot escape the penalty due for sin. . . . To cause suffering as the result of sin, is the means of destroying sin. Every supposed pleasure in sin will furnish more than its equivalent of pain, until belief in material life and sin is destroyed" (Pages 5 and 6).
