

### Wendell Wilkie's Book Makes Publishing History

With printings totalling 1,110,000 copies during its first month of publication, a new record has been established by Wendell Wilkie's book, ONE WORLD. ONE WORLD was published by Simon and Schuster on April 8th in two editions: paper bound and cloth bound. Printings of the paper bound editions, which sells for \$1.00 were 900,000 copies during the first month. Printings of the cloth bound edition, priced at \$2.00, were 200,000 during the same period. Daily sales have been averaging between 25,000 and 50,000 copies.
