Praise Follows Erwin's Portrayal in 'Good Night Ladies'

The Stuart Erwin who stepped into Buddy Edsen's shoes as co-star with Skeets Gallagher in "Good Night Ladies," is liable to discover that his forte is the theatre. As the simple, homespun comic of the cinema Stu went places fast, attained a peak and stayed among the dependable funny comedy players in a career that has spanned fifteen years.

Following Buddy Edsen can scarcely be regarded as a soft assignment, but the salvos accorded Erwin after his introductory performance must have made the successor regret that he spurned the part when the play was born on the West Coast 16 months ago and he was the first choice for the role he has taken over.

The cheers from the press and public for his portrayal of the girl shy professor Matthews in "Good Night Ladies" represents Stu's second triumph in the theatre this year. His portrait of the mailman in the Theatre Guild production of "Mr. Sycamore" won the plaudits of critics equaling any such acclaim bestowed on a star in many a season.

On June 14, 1777, the Continental Congress formally adopted the Stars and Stripes as the flag of the United States. While June 14 has never been declared a legal holiday, everywhere throughout the country some recognition is made of the day.

This year, as last, President Roosevelt has asked that the flags of all United Nations be honored during the week starting Monday, June 14. Consequently the week has been designated as United Nations Week.

The "United Nations" are frequently mentioned these days in newspapers, periodicals, books and every day conversation. But could you name them? In case you have forgotten, the United Nations are: The United States; the United Kingdom; the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics; China; Australia; Belgium; Canada; Costa Rica; Cuba; Czechoslovakia; Dominican Republic; El Salvador; Greece; Guatemala; Haiti, Honduras; India; Luxembourg; The Netherlands; New Zealand; Nicaragua; Norway; Panama; Poland; South Africa; Yugoslavia; Mexico; The Philippines; Ethiopia; Brazil; Iraq, and Bolivia. The Fighting French are identified with the United Nations, though not constituted as a government. The Danish Legation in Washington has associated itself with the United Nations on behalf of all Free Danes.

Why I'm looking younger every day

The secret of my youthful looks and perfect condition? Why, I owe it all to my owner for giving me special wartime care.

She certainly has the right idea. She knows that if she treats me right I'll go on safeguarding the family's food and health for a long, long time.

Yep, she's a bright little woman . . . and you'd be, too, if you'd give your electric refrigerator this wartime care. It's really very simple. Here, I'll show you what to do.

Give it air—Be sure your refrigerator is placed an inch or more away from the wall, so that there will be free circulation about the cabinet. If the refrigerator is in a small room, leave the door of the room open.

Close the door! When the door of your refrigerator is open, frost forms on the freezing unit more rapidly. And that means you must defrost more often. So keep the door closed as much as possible.

Saturday bath—Give your refrigerator a wash every time you defrost, using water with baking soda. After washing and drying, dust the rubber insulation around the door with talcum powder.

Don't crowd food or beverage bottles against the freezing unit. This interferes with the free circulation of cold air inside the cabinet, and thus prevents the refrigerator from operating at its maximum efficiency.

Time to defrost—When the frost becomes 1/4-inch thick, defrost the freezing unit; otherwise your refrigerator will run too often. Two hints: *don't* put hot water in the trays to speed defrosting; *don't* forget to empty the drip water after defrosting.

What about the motor?—There are many types of refrigerating mechanisms, and each requires a different kind of care. Consult the manufacturer's instructions for your refrigerator and see what attention it needs. If you are uncertain, see your serviceman.

Lady, please! Never use anything sharp to remove cube trays. And before putting them back be sure to dry the bottom of the trays. This will help keep the trays from freezing to the compartment.

Play safe! Don't trust the life of your refrigerator to a handyman. If it should get out of adjustment or become noisy, call an expert service man to make a check-up on the mechanism. In the long run you'll save money and spare yourself extra trouble.
