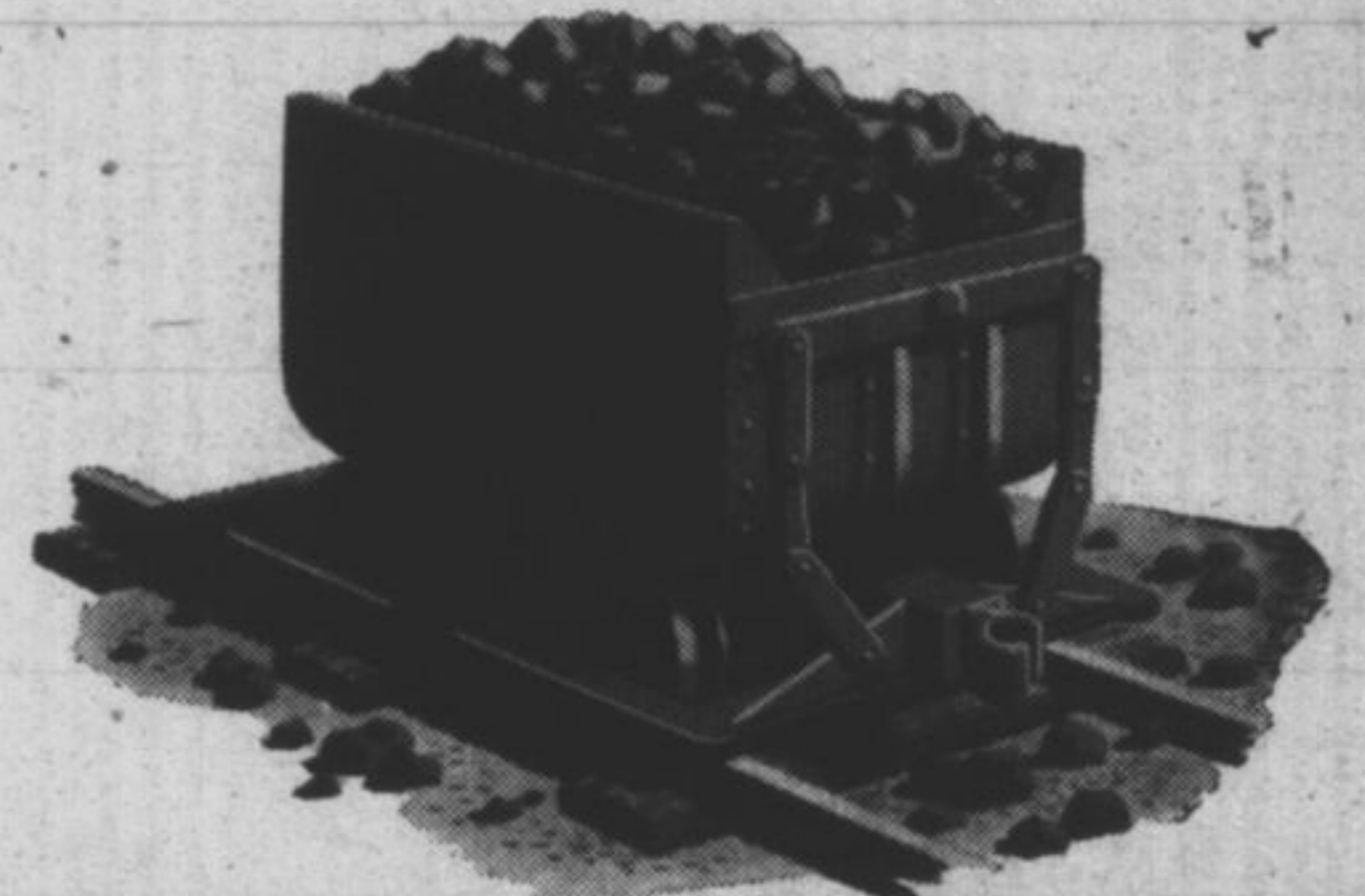
Three Local Students Gain Place on Purdue Honor Roll
